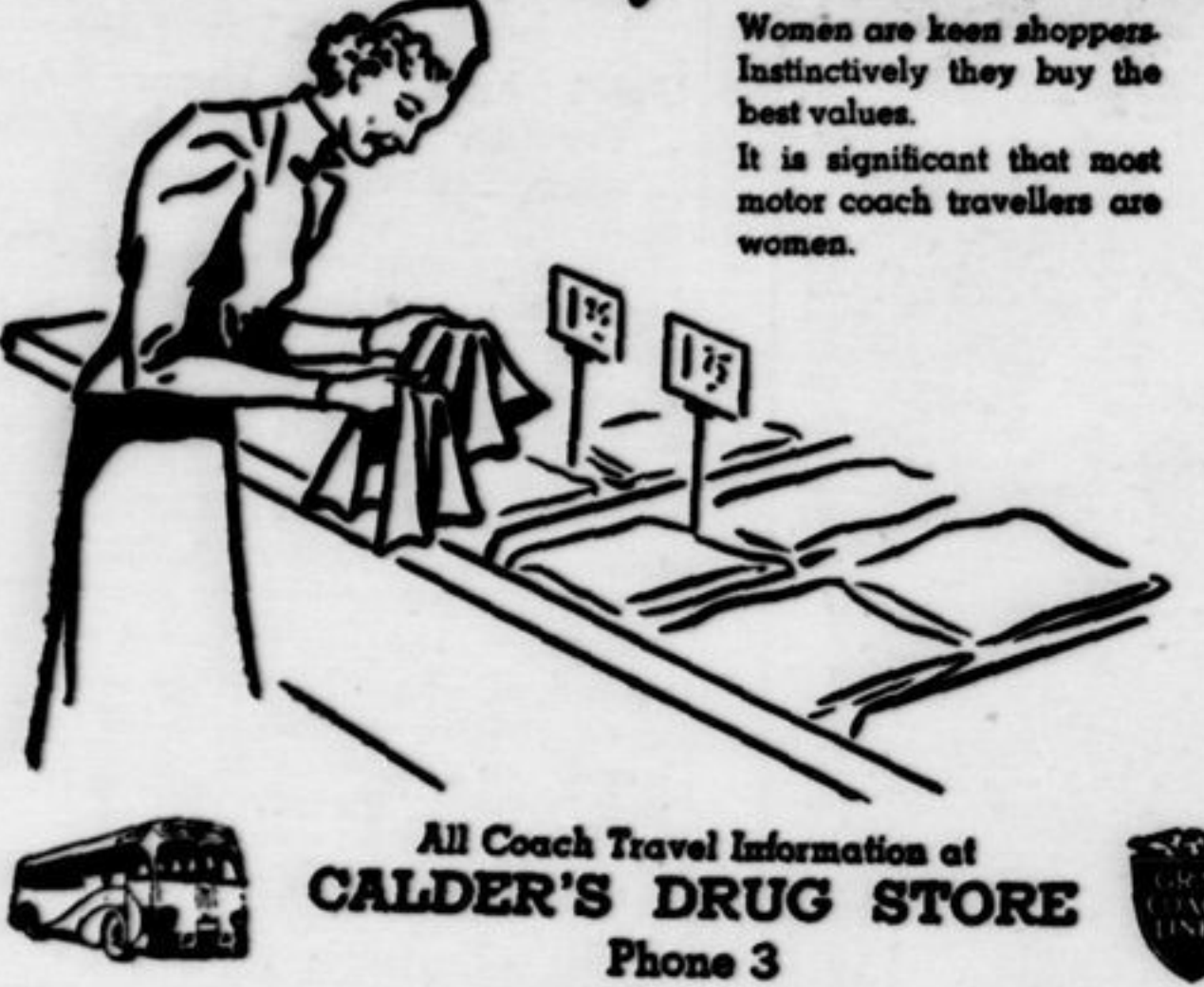


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HOLSTEIN LEADER

The sympathy of the community is extended to the bereaved: Messdames, Lee, Brown, and McGuire in the death of their mother, Mrs. George Ritchie.


