The common belief that almost all women are amateur smugglers and that no woman thinks it a crime to cheat the gover-ment or a big corporation is disproved by the experience of government investigators, declares Gretta Palmer. Quoting facts and figures, she writes in McCall's for

"In spite of the common belief that large numbers of women smuggle new clothes into the country, the government inspectors know that this is not true. Their own experts are trained reasonably low. They know about the women who wear three dresses, one on top of the other, and about the women who sew old labels in new foreign coats. But they say that such acid crystals.
