Overheated Electric Iron Causes Early Morning Fire

Mr. and Mrs. Wallace McGowan and family were roused from their slumbers about six o'clock Thursday morning, May 26th, by a neighbor, Mr. Cole, who noticed smoke issuing from their kitchen roof. It is the rear part of the dwelling of Mrs. McGowan's parents, town clerk R. H. and Mrs. Willis and over the kitchen and living room is an attic where fire originated. Before the Brigade arrived flames were issuing from roof and the interior was badly damaged by smoke and water before the blaze was quenched. A large hole was burned through floor and south roof partially destroyed. At first McGowans could not surmise the cause of blaze as no fires were on. Mrs. McGowan had been using an electric iron, ironing in the attic the previous afternoon, as the kitchen was being repainted. Not finished ironing, she had turned the power off but had not disconnected the iron. Her sister, Reta Willis went to attic for something about 11 p.m., and turned the switch on. With bulb removed, no light appeared, so she secured a flashlight for her needs, and left the power turned on, unaware the iron was connected. It overheated during night, burned a hole through ironing board, thence through floor and a heated wash-basin fell through on chestfield in living room below, burning a large hole in upholstery. Except in attic, other furniture was not much damaged. The living room and kitchen had just been redecorated.

(By our Mulock correspondent) A life-long resident of this neighborhood, Mr. Alex. Brown, passed away at Owen Sound hospital on May 24th. He had been unwell for some time and was taken to the hospital a day or so previous, when an operation was performed, and a growth found in his stomach which was too large to be removed. He passed away the next day. Deceased was in his sixty-eighth year, and was born and grew to manhood on the farm on con. 9, Bentinck, where he lived his entire life with his sister Kate. He was a son of the late James and Margaret Brown, pioneers of Bentinck township, who died many years ago. He was a life-long member of Crawford United Church, and was always willing to do his share in any work that was undertaken for the good of the church. Of late years he has attended Burns' Presbyterian church, Rocky Saugeen. The late Mr. Brown was a man held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. He was a kind and obliging neighbor who was always ready to assist in time of need. His passing will leave a vacancy in the community, and especially in the home, where he will be so sadly missed by his only sister Kate, who faithfully cared for him during his illness.

The funeral service will be held at the home Thursday afternoon at 2.00 o'clock, and interment will be made in Rocky cemetery. Rev. S. W. Hirtle of Durham will conduct the service.

SOUTH WARD NO. 3. 1 Long and 3 Short Blasts. All South of Saddle St. East and West of Garafraxa St. to town limits.

WEST WARD NO. 4. 1 Long and 4 Short Blasts. West of Garafraxa St. between Railway tracks and Saddle St. to town limits. Parties reporting a fire are requested to state Ward, so that proper alarm may be given.
