The Late David Allan

For 23 years Clerk of Egremont Tp.

After a brave but losing fight, a most prominent citizen much beloved and respected by all those who knew him passed to the "Great Beyond" on Tuesday evening, May 24th, at the setting of the sun in the person of David Allan, in his 68th year. Six years ago on the 29th, of April, 1932 he suffered a paralytic stroke from which he never recovered, being bed-fast for one year and a half, but through all these years of suffering he was most patient and cheerful, always looking forward to recovery.

His wife has been the devoted and loving nurse assisted by his two daughters Inez and Vera, through the six years of sickness, and no one will feel the break caused by death more keenly. Their devotion has often been marked. Perhaps there were few better known men in the Township and surrounding country than the late David Allan.

Born in the Township of Egremont, a son of the late David and Mrs. Allan, his whole lifetime and lifework have been spent in the community. He had the friendly and cheery disposition that was characteristic of his later years. Nothing seemed to tire him, nothing was too much trouble whether for his family, neighbors, church or township.

In the year 1915 he succeeded his late father as Township Clerk, who for thirty-two years previous attained the same office. He also succeeded his father in charge of the market scales, which was continued, with the aid of his family, until two years ago. He was Treasurer of Holstein Creamery, also Secretary Treasurer of the Holstein Public School Board for many years but to attempt to give a condensed biography of Mr. Allan is to give a historical sketch of Egremont Township and especially the clerical part, apart from being a most successful farmer, owning at the time of his death one hundred acres of land bordering on the village of Holstein.

He was a pillar of Holstein Presbyterian Church and served for many years on the Board of Managers. He was also a faithful member of the choir for over thirty years, being especially fond of music. His aim in life was not so much to make material gains as it was to live the life of a constant Christian and follow the steps of the Master.

In the home life (which is manhood's real test) he was always the loving husband and father, and his family regard this heritage as something sacred. With Mrs. Allan (who was formerly Jane Adeline Logan of Egremont Tp.) there are two children, Vera and Inez who will mourn the passing of a loving husband and father. Two sisters and two brothers also survive, Betty (Mrs. W. J. Robertson), Lena, and James C. Allan all of Toronto; Isaac of Detroit, Mich, who was unable to be present. A sister Mary predeceased him several years ago.

Laid to Rest

The funeral of the late David Allan on Friday last was very largely attended, the deceased having been one of the most well-known men in the township. A private service was conducted at the home after which a public service was held in the Presbyterian church. Rev. Mr. Court, deceased's pastor, assisted by Rev. Mr. Mercer conducted the services. "Jesus Lover of My Soul" and "The Sands of Time are Sinking" favorite hymns of the deceased, were sung. Mrs. Hutchison and Miss Norma McIntyre of Mount Forest sang very beautifully. "Jesus Saviour Pilot Me," also another of the deceased's favorite hymns. A devoted friend of the family, Mrs. Irene Gibson, of Mt. Forest, rendered her services as organist, being a request of the deceased.

Interment was made in Holstein cemetery, the pall bearers being James Lothian, Walter A. Reeves, William J. McFadden, William Allan, George Cowan, Edward Lindsay, Flower bearers were Horace E.
