ELECTRIC ORGAN TO ASSIST FIRST NATIONAL EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS



The Eucharistic Congress dates back to 1874 when Mlle. Tamisier of Tourine, France, felt called to inaugurate a movement for a greater public devotion to the Holy Eucharist.
