First Services of United Churches Sunday

Queen St. and Knox United churches last Sunday held their first services combined as one congregation, when in Knox church, Rev. George W. Barker, president of the Toronto Conference, preached two inspiring and appropriate sermons before large congregations. The pastor Rev. W. H. Smith B. A., was in charge and early in the morning service the membership rolls were brought forward by W. J. Ritchie, clerk of Session for Knox Church, and by Robt. Whitmore, Clerk of Session for Queen Street church. The pastor then tied the two rolls together, while the congregation sang "Hilb is the Tie that Binds."

Rev. Mr. Barker based his message on two texts: "Now ye are the body of Christ," Cor. 12: 27; and "They were all with one accord in one place" from Acts 2: 1, telling of the gathering of the Christians on the day of Pentecost. The church is vaster than what we imagine, greater than any local organization; it is the body of Christ. People of all times have prophesied that the Christian church would die, yet nations have risen and fallen and the Christian church has outlived even that. It is this great church is to live, it must be able to meet adequately the problems of today which are entirely different from those of our forefathers. Turning specifically to the two congregations uniting this day, he applied the second text. If this congregation formed today were to become a living and integral part of the great Christian church, they must feel the living presence of Christ always in the church, for a church without Christ's presence forever real and felt was not a church at all but a shell. Only by letting Christ have full possession of their hearts could they put Him in their church. Secondly, the church must be a great force against evil. Next, it was to be a place where comfort and strength might always be found; and lastly, it could only be such a church if every individual assumed his share of responsibility.

In the evening Mr. Barker's message was "A new Vision of a new day." The task of the 20th century is to put God on the Throne or perish. The speaker told of the corrupt and evil conditions prevailing in England two or three centuries ago, and how the great revival under Wesley and Whitfield had changed and raised the whole moral standards of the nation.

The choir of thirty members under the leadership of G. R. Padfield with Miss Jean Priest at the organ sang an anthem at each service, "Rejoice the Lord is King." "Consider and Hear Me," Mrs. M. Wilson taking the solo in the latter; and the men's chorus of twelve voices sang "The Heavens are Telling" and "Come Unto Me and Rest."
