W. H. HUNTER, EGREMONT ADDRESSES MARKDALE CLUB

W. H. Hunter, Egremont, Inspector for the Commissioner of Agricultural loans in the County of Grey, spoke of his work in that office to the Rotarians of Markdale last week, and it was well received.
 In the opening the speaker informed the Club that there were approximately 700 loans in the County of Grey to the Government ranging from under \$1000.00 to about \$12,000 with an average of about \$2,500. This meant that the Government held mortgages in the County of about one and three quarter millions. The mortgages called for yearly payments of slightly over \$70.00 per thousand dollars and accordingly the annual income to the Government if all payments were made would be about \$129,000. There were of course many mortgages in arrears and many who are making only partial payments. As Inspector it was his duty to make collections and valuations and when a farm was taken over to repair the buildings and rent it or make a sale. He had sold 25 farms in the past year, and there were 15 on hand. The usual terms of sale are 10% deposit and the balance spread over 20 years with interest at 4%.
 The speaker pointed out that in his opinion the Government was not taking as heavy losses on sale of repossessed farms as was generally believed. He thought that there had not been any loss in 90% of the cases and a profit had been made on occasions. In many cases farms had depreciated 50% since the loan was made and in some cases the mortgage had been reduced by proceedings taken under the F. C. A. Act.

"Elm Grove" Mink Farm East of Durham

The Review scribbles were printed to pay a visit last week to the "Elm Grove" mink ranch, owned by Wm. B. Patterson on his farm 2nd con. Glenora, and to witness feeding. Only recently did we know there was such a business and our readers have also been under the fact.
 Mr. Patterson started in the some time ago, but at present confined in their pens one hundred and thirteen of these dark little minks, whose hides are in such demand in the manufacture of the mink are all of one side—dark Northern Quebec and home is down in a hollow immediately west of Mr. Patterson's residence with a beautiful grove in the background. Here they are housed in pens three buildings, all neatly kept, water pan fastened in each pen. In the main building, where the of the stock is the females are on one side, males on the other, their individual pens. These are up-to-date for the purpose, newly made by the proprietor, are fronted, floored and ceiling with wire netting, about 26 ins. by 5 ft. high with partition in even and a round hole through partition to allow the mink to pass through either side. At back of one side-pen is the nest, and at back of other side is the exit to their outdoor pen when they are out in the open, enclosed in wire netting. There are two rows of these pens on each making compact use of space.
 The mink are fed each morning evening, their main diet being a mixture of horse meat, or beef or ground hogs, with cereal, and also cod fish oil, and vegetables. This is placed in the buildings, in the form of mash, in a large pan, and a handle placed on top of each pen. The little black animals jump on a bench inside, and stretch out to the top of pen, to pull down their food through the wire mesh.
 Mr. Patterson plans to reduce his stock by half or more this fall through selling them to other ranchers for breeding purposes, and by selling, but with the arrival of young ones next year, he will probably have an enlarged ranch next summer. He has some choice stock now for sale.

Mr. R. J. Stewart, assistant superintendent with the Standard Paying Co., who have had the paving contract between Allan Park and Hanover, leaves for Brockville this coming Saturday, the work being completed here. Mr. Stewart received a pleasant surprise on Tuesday, when the men working under him presented him with a wrist watch and a moustache pipe.
