HIDDEN TAXES AND EMPLOYMENT
 Property taxes are the largest single source of tax revenue amounting to about 40 per cent of all taxation. They are levied upon the assessed value of all land and buildings and frequently upon all equipment used in industrial and commercial operations. They are a first charge against the ownership of all property and must be paid even if standing idle and earning no revenues at all. If property and business investments yield no revenue and operate at a loss to their owners, property taxes are a direct tax upon capital even to the extent that if the owner is unable to pay the tax his property may be confiscated and sold.
 The second largest source of tax revenues are Sales Taxes which account for about 17 per cent of all taxation. There is Dominion Government Sales Tax of 8 per cent, payable on goods manufactured and taken out of warehouse for consumption. The sales tax is a direct levy upon capital as well as a charge upon the cost of goods of a consumable nature. In the case of new construction or additions to existing property, sales tax is payable on all materials used and on all equipment installed.
 Taxes are also payable on telegraph and telephone messages, on certain travelling expenses, on cheques, bills of exchange, notes, stock transfers and many other items of operating expense.
 Taxes collected in Customs Duties are small in comparison with the taxes enumerated above, amounting in all to 11.5 per cent. of all taxation. In addition to these direct taxes upon investments and operating costs, certain Social Legislation has had an indirect effect the same as that of a direct tax. The costs of administration of such Legislation and the increased wage costs involved are a direct charge upon business costs in addition to all other taxation and increase prices accordingly.
 How many Canadians, especially farmers and those with small incomes, realize that every time they make a purchase or rent a house to live in, they are paying 58.3 per cent. of the taxes collected and spent by their Governments?
 If a substantially large portion of our total taxation were collected as Income Tax, and if the Income Tax base were broadened to reach the lower incomes as in Great Britain, and all those who now unknowingly pay these taxes paid the same amount to their Governments as Income Tax, there would be more "tax consciousness" and there would be greater demand for a control of Government spending, and less demand for Government control of business. But of greater importance, more encouragement would be given to the accumulation of profits, without which the private ownership and operation of business cannot exist. This we believe is the first essential to the restoration of profitable employment for all our people.— From "Dominion Engineer."

SAFETY GROUP WARNS AGAINST SUNSTROKE
 Sunstroke is very much different from heat prostration, the Industrial Accident Prevention Association points out in a concise bulletin issued this week, which states the symptoms and recommends first aid treatments.
 Symptoms may be recognized by:
 1. Hot dry skin and red face.
 2. High fever, dizziness, shooting pains and headache.
 3. Hard, loud breathing and convulsions.
 4. Pulse quick and pounding.
 5. Patient may become insensible.
 Recommended treatment is:
 1. Remove to shady place and remove outer clothing to waist.
 2. Lay on back with head and shoulders raised.
 3. Apply ice or cold water to head, cool body with water or wet cloth, but avoid shock.
 4. When conscious and able to drink, give cool — not iced — water. Give no stimulants.
