Exploding Stove Causes Loss of Home and Store Stock

When a gasoline stove exploded in the kitchen of their home about 6.20 Sunday evening, Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Arnill were helpless to prevent the entire destruction of their store and stock, and residence above with all contents, during the next few hours.

The store was a large brick structure with basement, with residence above, worth \$5,000 or \$6,000 and contained a stock of approximately \$8,000. None of it could be saved.

Mr. Arnill plans, now that his business is gone, to take a fortnight's holiday in Detroit and elsewhere, and rebuild a smaller and more modern store, on the ruined site.

Mr. Arnill is at present living at Mr. Bert Eccles' home but will renovate their own six-roomed house to the rear of the store, lately vacated by Mr. Duke. It was not damaged at the fire, and Mr. and Mrs. Arnill will occupy it as a residence shortly.

Barrow 8 to 5 Favorite over O'Sullivan Friday night

Great interest is being manifested in the first professional boxing tournament to be staged in Durham Arena Friday night, when some hotly contested scraps are looked for.

Attracting wide attention is the main clash when Jack O'Sullivan Durham's white hope who has sprung to prominence in the boxing world, will again face Leroy Barrow, the 6½ foot negro from Detroit, who lost a close decision last month here to O'Sullivan.

Barrow is still training with his cousin, champion Joe Louis. He boxes 4 rounds daily and has increased his road work to six miles, plus other gym work like rope skipping, shadow boxing, and punching the light and heavy bags, a total of 12 rounds daily and he predicts he will knock O'Sullivan out in 3 rounds to erase the stigma of his unblemished career.

He says he knows that he won the fight last time here, but was given a raw deal and that this time he insists on impartial officials, especially a referee that can count up to ten over O'Sullivan.

O'Sullivan's reply to this is that Barrow can bring his own referee, his own water bucket and a bottle of smelling salts to revive him, when Jack gets through with him.

O'Sullivan is still training with Big Boy Brackey, who stands 6 ft. 5 in., and the way Jack handles Brackey with ease, he should give Barrow a merry evening. Without a doubt, this is a grudge fight and the fans should expect a treat in an old-fashioned slugfest, which has all the indications of ending in a K.O.
