O'Sullivan again Wins in Main Bout of Tournament

Some 1300 fans crowded into the Durham Arena last Friday night to witness one of the best boxing cards ever seen in this part of the province; in fact, one traveller who was there, stated you wouldn't see as good a performance in Toronto for anything near the same money.

The highlight was again the heavy-weight bout; this time a grudge fight between Jack O'Sullivan the Durham boy who is coming strong with his fists, and Leroy Barrow, the 6 1/2 foot negro from Detroit, cousin and sparring partner of champion Joe Louis.

Last month's bout looked to be about a draw, but O'Sullivan was given a questionable decision. On Friday it went 8 rounds, and while there was nothing resembling a knockout to either, O'Sullivan was well entitled to the clear decision he received.

He exhibited some skilful boxing and had the advantage in four of the eight rounds. Barrow gained a slight edge in two, and the others were even. O'Sullivan has power behind his punches and the crowd loudly applauded his win.

The best bout from the spectators' viewpoint was the semi-final—also 8 rounds, where Mel. Glionna, Canadian lightweight champion of Toronto, won a clear verdict over Leo. Jennings of Detroit, in several rounds, they went to it hammer and tongs, and fists were flying with rare abandon.

Glionna had the best of it in 6 of the 8 rounds. The opening bout saw Gordon Greenwood of Durham matched with Andy Ross of Niagara Falls. It was a tight battle with honors even, until in the 5th round Ross landed a foul blow and Greenwood was declared winner.

Henry Carvill of Fiesherston took on Frank Egan of Buffalo. The first round was Carvill's as Egan mainly protected his face and absorbed his opponent's blows. In 2nd Egan had the advantage and still moved cautiously, but in 3rd he opened up a bruising, battering attack that Carvill couldn't cope with and knocked him out before a minute had elapsed.

The Fiesherston lad was game but uncounted, and had to be assisted from the ring, and it was some minutes before he came to.

Gordon McDonald of Durham was up against Walter Murray of Buffalo, an amateur boxer against an experienced one. McDonald made a strong showing the first four rounds and looked to have his opponent tottering in the 4th. However the local lad couldn't last it out, and weakened, in 5th Murray landed a jaw punch to send him reeling, and in 6th the referee called it, giving Murray the decision on a technical knockout as McDonald was in a daze and staying in on his grit.

The crowd enjoyed the night's bill, and will be ready for another tournament later on. The management could improve it considerably however, by dropping or materially shortening the long wait between preliminaries and semi-final.

Including the members of the host branch, 272 ladies registered at Clarksburg on Friday on the occasion of the 1938 convention of Grey County Women's Institutes.

The Community Hall, Clarksburg, was taxed to capacity for the event. It was the first time for four-fifths of the audience to meet in this spacious hall. About half had not been in the village before, but all seemed charmed with the convention spot and district. The ride through the Beaver Valley proved an especially fine sidelight on the journey to Clarksburg.

Williamsford had the largest delegation with 18 members. By a coincidence only three names of this delegation start in the A-L series of letters.

A Pricerville quartette comprising Belle Weir, Elda Frock, Margaret McArthur, and Mrs. Wilfrid Watson sang with Monica Lambert at the piano, sang very acceptably the "Whip-poor-Will" song and also "Santa Lucia." The village to the east of Durham has a fine ladies' vocal foursome in the aforesaid mentioned ladies.

Mrs. Wilfrid Wright of Hopeville gave a smart piano instrumental, which was a treat to hear, as was the debut selection on the same instrument by two charming Clarksburg lassies in Alice Lawrence and Rose Connor.

Two ladies from Stratford, namely Mrs. E. McGregor and daughter Miss Margaret were present. The vocal duet at the morning session by Mrs. Thos. Bell and Mrs. Joe McCaslin deserved the fine applause the selection received. The men folk who accompanied the ladies on the trip, at least skipped the concentrated heat of the hall interior, and took in the sights of Clarksburg and Thornbury communities.

The apple orchards here made a great impression on those who took time to look them over. The crops down from last year's but the quality is ever as good.
