Canada the Big Game Hunters' Paradise



Canada is still the finest big game area in North America. Moose, deer and caribou abound in the provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario, Alberta and British Columbia — the latter two offering mountain sheep, mountain goats and grizzly bears for good measure, but caribou may not be shot in Nova Scotia or New Brunswick. Early reports from outdoor guides in all these provinces indicate that game will be more plentiful this year than for many seasons past.

OWEN SOUND CLERGY ON THE DEFENSIVE

The Ministerial Association of Owen Sound are aroused and on their mettle. They learn that a "straw vote" petition, advocating beer parlors or a brewer's warehouse for Owen Sound, has been going through the mails in that city, for the rate-payers to ratify. It is sponsored by an unknown organization and the responsibility of the sponsors is questioned. As a consequence, the Association had read from the pulpits of Owen Sound last, C. G. McMillivray had a Sound churches Sunday last, the following petition, which members were asked to sign: "We, the undersigned voters of the City of Owen Sound, hereby register our emphatic protest and opposition to the efforts now being made by the liquor interests and certain interested individuals of the city, amongst a selected group of businessmen, which has for its purpose ultimately the establishing of beer rooms and liquor store in this city, and we further declare our unalterable opposition to the sale of liquor for beverage purposes in any form."

Over 700 signatures were affixed Sunday to the above petition and it is evident that if ever it comes to a vote in Owen Sound, the anti-wet forces will know the reason why.

1938 CANADA YEAR BOOK OUT

The national official Canada Year Book for 1938, has been issued, under authorization of Hon. W. D. Eulder, Minister of Trade and Commerce. As long as copies are available, this book will be supplied to the public by the King's Printer, Ottawa, at the price of \$1.50, which covers merely the cost of paper, press work and binding. By a special concession teachers and ministers may obtain paper bound copies at 50c each, but only a limited number has been set apart at this price. This book contains almost 1,200 pages and gives a wealth of up-to-date information and statistics about Canada.

SALES PROMOTION HEAD IS APPOINTED BY HYDRO

Formation of a Hydro sales promotion department under the direction of Morris J. McHenry is announced by the Ontario Hydro Electric Power Commission, through its chairman and chief engineer, Dr. T.H. Hogg. Mr McHenry, central figure in this new departure of Ontario's publicly-owned power system, will be responsible for dissemination of information on the varied uses of electric service. The Commission, it was explained in the announcement, believes that its duties are not fully

discharged by making available low-cost electric service throughout the Province. It feels that if the great range of uses and benefits of electric service in the home, farm and industry were better known, the consumption of power would be increased and its cost to the consumer further diminished.

Long and intimate contact with the electrical industry and the power problems of Ontario highly qualify Mr. McHenry to direct this new department within the Hydro Commission. He graduated from McGill University, Department of Electrical Engineering, in 1910; was associated with Messrs. Smith, Kerry & Chace, consulting engineers, Toronto; in 1912 joined the staff of the Apparatus Division, Toronto District Office, Canadian General Electric Company; in 1918 became manager of the Walkerville Hydro Electric System, where he completed an extensive rehabilitation program; became sales manager for the Ferranti Electric Company Limited; and in 1926 returned to Can. General Electric Company as manager of the U. S. Sales Department. Since 1930 he has been Toronto district manager of C.G.E.

Widely known in power circles across the entire continent, Mr. McHenry is past president of the Association of Municipal Electrical Utilities of Ontario, and at present present vice-president for Canada of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers. He is a member of the Association of Professional Engineers of Ontario, and a former member of the Board of Governors. He is president of the Electric Service League Toronto. In his new capacity Mr. McHenry will report directly to the Ontario Hydro Commission, and he will commence his duties about the middle of September.
