IN DAYS OF YORE

25 YEARS AGO

(from Review file September 4 1913)

The town of Hanover is levied for a 33 mill rate this year, the highest in the history of the corporation.

Damage to the extent of nearly \$150 was wrought upon the shoe stock of Thomas McGrath, shoe merchant, one day last week, when water from an unreturned tap in Kelsey's photograph gallery on the second floor, came through the ceiling partition and spoiled much of the valuable footwear of the shelves.

The High School department opened with an attendance of 77 with a certainty of more coming. An attendance of 30 first term, 25 in the 2nd and 22 in third will keep Principal Allan and his assistants from rusting.

Mr. Ray Farquharson left on Monday to take up higher scholastic work at Harbord St. Collegiate, Toronto.

Hanover's protest against Durham Juvenile Lacrosse Team over the Mt. Forest game was thrown out by the O.A.L.A. protest committee, as was expected in view of their wild unsubstantiated statements and the Durham team have been ordered to meet the Maitlands of Toronto in Orangeville to-day, in the semifinals. The winners will meet Bracebridge next week for the Juvenile championship.

The extensive establishment of rural mail delivery has resulted in numerous changes on the Post Office map and causing considerable trouble for those handling the mail matter. The latest changes in this district have been doing away with Crawford and Mulock offices in township of Bentinck, Monday being the last day for them. This part will be served from Elmwood in the future.

Priceville Corr. Rev. J. A. Matheson and family arrived home from Muskoka after a vacation there. Mr. Matheson conducted union services in the Methodist Church on Sunday last, Mr. Leece being away on his holidays at present.

Master Martin Bye had a narrow escape from more serious injury Saturday morning. He with others were playing near the exhaust pipe from the safety valve of Nicholson's mill, when one of his companions asked him to look in the pipe, which he did when the first boy suddenly raised the valve, allowing the steam to rush through the pipe, severely scalding Martin's face and neck. Under the Dr's care he is progressing as well as could be expected.
