## Car Crashed into Bridge: 4 Owen Sounders Injured

Coming into Durham last Saturday evening about 6.30 p. m. an Owen Sound car driven by Gordon Harrison crashed into the north-west corner of the large steel and concrete bridge over the Saugeen River on No. 4 Highway, just east of Durham sary last Spring, from which he failed to fully recover.

The deceased was the son of the late Ezekiel Aldred and the late Mary J. Sirrs and is the last member of a family or ten. He was born in Ben-Geddes in 1855 on farm where Gordon Aldred now resides. When a small lad his parents moved to lot 70 on the 2nd concession of Bentinck, on which Elton Lewis now resides, where he grew into manhood and here he established his own home in 1882, when he married Mary Ann and Roseboroughs nearby heard the crash, and they immediately set to work extricating the victims. All were residents of Owen Sound. Miss Wanie Lamb was most critically injured, suffering a fractured skull and a fractured left leg while Ben Thibet, a sixteen-year lad had a broken left leg. The driver, Gordon Harrison had his hands badly lacerated and other cuts and bruises. While the fourth occupant, J. W. Hayden escaped with a shake-up and some bruises.

Hayden was taken home that night; the other three at Durham Hospital where their wounds were dressed and they remained overnight. Next day the Owen Sound ambulance made three trips here, receiving a patient each time to Owen Sound G. & M. Hospital where X-rays were taken. We understand their condition is satisfactory and all will recover.

## Car Crashed in Buggy; Occupants Escaped Lightly

On No. 6 Highway, north of Maplewood corner last Thursday night Mrs. Elton Lewis and her son driving in a buggy with light attached, were run into by a car of Mount Forest young men and the buggy smashed. The boy was thrown clear and escaped injury, and Mrs. Lewis fortunately suffered no broken bones, but was painfully bruised, and taken to Durham hospital to recuperate.

### GIVEN TWO MONTHS

W. R. Matthews, Normanby Township farmer, was sentenced by Magistrate Sperean in police court on Thursday to two months in the county jail following his conviction on a charge of false pretences, says the Owen Sound Sun-Times.

Evidence given in the case showed that Matthews had issued a number of cheques on a bank in Mount Forest and that there were no funds on deposit there to meet them. He had been before the Magistrate two months ago on a similar charge and was given a suspended sentence, but again transgressed the law. Character evidence in his favor was given, but the Magistrate stated that the circumstances pointed to Matthews issuing these cheques deliberately, which was a serious offence.

## OBITUARY

### JOHN ALDRED

John A. Aldred, a very highly respected citizen of Durham, passed away at his residence on Sunday, September 25th, 1938, in his eighty-fourth year. Mr. Aldred enjoyed excellent health until about a year ago, but an operation became necessary last Spring, from which he failed to fully recover.

The deceased was the son of the late Ezekiel Aldred and the late Mary J. Sirrs and is the last member of a family or ten. He was born in Ben-Geddes in 1855 on farm where Gordon Aldred now resides. When a small lad his parents moved to lot 70 on the 2nd concession of Bentinck, on which Elton Lewis now resides, where he grew into manhood and here he established his own home in 1882, when he married Mary Ann and Roseboroughs nearby heard the crash, and they immediately set to work extricating the victims. All were residents of Owen Sound. Miss Wanie Lamb was most critically injured, suffering a fractured skull and a fractured left leg while Ben Thibet, a sixteen-year lad had a broken left leg. The driver, Gordon Harrison had his hands badly lacerated and other cuts and bruises. While the fourth occupant, J. W. Hayden escaped with a shake-up and some bruises.

This addition to their house was many times used for religious gatherings as it was eight years before they had a church opened. Different denominations desired to have permission to organize a congregation, but Mr. Aldred and several of his neighbors had a firm belief that the only church built should be a community church. Eventually this wish was fulfilled and an undenominational church was built and dedicated to the worship of God.

Mr. Aldred's work began in the church after his conversion at revival meetings held in a little church that was built on the farm now owned by Walter McAllister in Normanby and known as the Grassy appointment. It was a local preacher, John Poythc, who was conducting the revival services. Some time later he helped to build the present Varney church. For eighteen years Mr. Aldred was superintendent of the Sunday School at Varney Methodist church. In the community church at Ceylon he served as an elder and after returning to Durham in 1924 he was eventually elected an elder of Knox United church.

It was in 1917 Mrs. Aldred passed away at their home at Ceylon Sask and seven years later, after retiring from active farming and returning to Grey County he wed Mrs. Marion Marshall and has resided since in Durham.

Mr. Aldred ever took an active interest in sport. Curling was a West-ern sport he enjoyed much, but only an occasional open air rink has been possible for the game in Durham. Bowling and quoits have given many moments of companionship with players in competitive activities.

Besides his sorrowing wife Mr. Aldred is survived by one daughter, Margaret, of Toronto; and three sons Harry, Roy and Percy, all of Ceylon Saskatchewan, and a niece, Mrs. Harry Wilkinson of Mount Forest, who was always one of the sorrowing family. There are also three step-daughters: Mrs. W. Houghan (Harriet) of Milverton; Mrs. Albert Livingstone (Zetta), Dornoch; Mrs. Ivan Edwards (Janet), of Shelburne.

After a private service at the house, the funeral service took place at Knox United Church on Wednesday afternoon, and was attended by an
