Wishes to Operate Movie Theatre in Durham

Durham Council, in session Monday night, were addressed by Mr. Fingold of the Roxy Theatre, Mt. Forest, who wished to rent the Town Hall here for two nights a week, Wednesday and Saturday, for motion pictures, if a reasonable rental could be obtained. He might later, if profitable engage it for three nights a week and was ready to pay a year's rental in advance, as a guarantee of good faith. Most of the councillors thought favorably of it, believing a good movie theatre an asset to the town, and were ready to co-operate. Heating and other hall expenses would be considerably increased, and the Council passed a resolution to rent it as a movie hall for \$5 a night, twice weekly. Mr. Fingold left before discussion, but the Finance Com. were appointed to interview him, as to rates.

Two more town properties taken in at tax sale, were sold for taxes and costs. Geo. Tracey gets the Yorkshire Tom Wilson house and lot on Countess st. for \$20 a month until paid in full, with 1938 taxes also, and to J. A. Caswell was sold the Styles' house and lot on Durham Hill for \$150 down and balance next year, with current taxes. The McCormick vacant lot next to Mrs. Pearl McCormick, was offered to her at a nominal figure.

Rental were fixed for the Davis property taken over, which if not paid, the tenants must "get out."

General acts, of \$455, and relief accounts for Sept. totalling \$40.75 were passed.

A letter of condolence, expressing deep regret at the passing of Co. Clerk Rutherford, was ordered to be forwarded to his wife and family.

The Mayor, also on Public Utilities Com., is to look into the agreement with the town, re the Commission paying office rent for their premises.

Cum. McKeechne mentioned that Fred Osborne a ked permission to cut down some poplar trees on Sadler St., which block the street in winter with snow. Permission was granted to remove them.

Sudden Death of County Clerk Rutherford

In the death of Fred H. Rutherford, Owen Sound loses one of its leading citizens, a man who has, for the past 23 years, rendered outstanding service as Secretary-Treasurer of the Board of Education, and for the same period of time served the County of Grey as County Clerk since the death of his father.

Mr. Rutherford's death occurred on Sunday morning from heart trouble after an illness of only two days. He had not been in the best of health for some time but his sudden passing was a terrible shock to his family, and a regrettable surprise to a wide circle of friends. It was not generally known that he had been ill although he attended Kiwanis Club on Thursday only long enough to register his attendance. Mr. Rutherford was in his 60th year, having passed his 59th birthday in July.

The deceased took a great interest in educational matters, and was president of the Ratepayers & Trustees section of the O. E. A. As County Clerk he was widely and popularly known, an obliging official, and one to whom all Co. Council members looked for information. He was a member of St. George's Lodge, A. F. & A. M., Owen Sound and in his younger days, a star athlete in baseball, hockey and lacrosse.

He was a son of the late Mr and Mrs John Rutherford, and leaves to mourn, his wife (formerly Miss Audrey Maitland, one time resident in Durham) and three children: Allan, Herbert 8, and June 9 years old.

OBITUARY

WILLIAM CHARLES CALDWELL
Sorrow pervades the William C. Caldwell home on 2nd con. Normanby, when on Monday morning, death claimed husband and father. While friends knew death was imminent the passing always leaves a shock that time alone can heal. Deceased was 76 years of age and the last member of his family, two brothers, Samuel and Rev. Harry Caldwell having "gone on before."

Sixty-three years ago he came with his parents to Normanby township from Simcoe county and has since been a continuous resident. He was wedded forty-six years ago to May Storrey of Durham, who survives with two children. Harry on the home farm and Myrtle, Mrs. Norman Kerr, Varney. Mr. Caldwell was the quiet type of citizen, but as a neighbor and friend he was hard to excel. For many years he has been a member of Varney United Church and in health regular at its services. Deceased was also a member of Varney Orange Lodge.

The funeral service took place from his late residence on Wednesday afternoon, and interment was made in Maplewood cemetery.

Harvey Voisin Dies from Injuries at Waterford

The sad news of serious injury to Harvey Voisin at Waterford Sand & Gravel Co. plant where he has been employed last summer and this year, came to Durham relatives Monday.

His sister, Mrs. H. W. Wilson and her sons Wm. and Ken., on receiving the message that he had his right leg cut off below the knee about 10.30 that morning, left at noon, arriving there in two hours. The injured man conversed with them for a time, but shortly after, he lost consciousness, and died at 10.00 o'clock that evening.

Harvey was running the dinky engine at the plant, hauling one full and one empty car of crushed stone, when in rounding a curve, the engine jumped the track and bumped on the ties. He was shaken off, and falling with leg across the rail, the wheels ran across it and severed it below the knee, while he suffered a big cut in his other leg below hip, some of the flesh being gouged out and arteries cut. A couple men working on a shovel saw the mishap, and helped to pull him out. Had he hung on a few seconds longer, he would have been safe, as the engine came to a stop in three feet.

Deceased was born at Park Head 30 years ago, the youngest son of John and the late Mrs. Voisin. About 12 years ago, he came to Durham and was employed at the local Stone & Sand plant until going to Waterford last year. Almost five years ago he was wedded to Miss Corinae Lawrence of town, who survives him; also his father in Durham, five brothers, three sisters and a niece Miss Ruby Voisin in town who grew up with the family. The brothers and sisters are: George on the home farm at Park Head; Mrs. Harvey Wilson and Andy, Durham; Joe near Formosa; Fred near Belleville; Alex of Dorion near Fort William; James, Detroit, Mrs. Benninger, Gull Lake, Sask. His mother died 13 years ago.

The funeral will take place from the Wilson home here at 2.30 Thursday, and interment will be made in Durham cemetery.

Suit Against Town Dismissed with Costs

Pending since last Spring, an action brought by Mrs. Margaret Kearns against the Town of Durham for \$500 damages, was dismissed with costs by Mr. Justice Holmes of Barrie, at the trial in Owen Sound on Tuesday. Mrs. Kearns claimed this amount as compensation for her fall on Queen St. when icy last February, when she fractured her wrist.

Six witnesses for each side were heard, and as the Town proved that street was sanded 2 or 3 days previously, and had exercised reasonable judgment in sanding streets, Justice Holmes concluded the Town could not be held responsible, when all streets were frequently icy in winter.

W. D. Henry K.C., acted for the plaintiff and F. G. McKay for the defendant.
