IN DAYS OF YORE

25 YEARS AGO (from Review file, Nov. 6th 1913) There is considerable talk rife in the municipalities of Guelph and Owen Sound over the proposed construction of an electric railway, starting at Guelph for its southern point and proceeding northward to the Georgian Bay. One proposal is to start a line from Hespeler, thence touching Preston Guelph, Elora, Ferguson, Arthur, entering Grey Co. near the townline between Proton and Egremont Townships, continuing northward, crossing the C. P. R. line at Markdale and terminating at either Meaford or Thornbury. Another report has it that the line will pass through Mount Forest, Durham, Owen Sound, and thence eastward to Meaford. Rev. Mr Cooper, Mt. Forest, preached on Sunday last in the Presbyterian Church, and representing the Presbytery, called a congregational meeting at the close of the service. Rev. Dr. Farquharson at this meeting, referred feelingly to the fourteen years of association between them as pastor and people, and to the illness, which had interfered with his usefulness. He was gaining in strength but had thought it best to give up the work. The Rev. Mr Cooper informed them that Rev. Dr. Farquharson's resignation was in the hands of the Presbytery. The following by motion were appointed delegates to Presbytery meeting on the 18th inst.: C. L. Grant, Wm. Young, Dr. Jamieson, Sr. and C. Ramage. Before adjourning a motion was made that Dr Farquharson be asked to withdraw his resignation and the response by standing vote showed a remarkable heartiness and unanimity. There passed away on Thursday last at a ripe old age Euphemia, widow the late Alex Turnbull, who predeceased her many years ago. For many years she has made her home with her son Thos who with his wife have been unremitting in their care and administrations to the aged pioneer. Mr and Mrs Robt.
