Mt. Forest Man Killed; Cars Crash at Letter Breen

Mr Wm. Evans, who drives the Sunoco oil truck for Lorne Smith of Mt. Forest, was fatally injured Sunday morning in a crash at Letter Breen Corner, on No. 6 Highway, three miles north of Mount Forest and twelve miles south of Durham.

A car driven by a Mr Blyth of Cliff Road came out the Normanby side road alongside the church there, onto the main highway and crashed into Evans' car, which was travelling north.

Mr Evans was accompanied by his wife and was on his way to visit his parents living near Desboro. With them was Eugin Blythe of Varney, who was en route to his home. The collision occurred about about 1.00 o'clock and so seriously was Mr Evans injured that he died in Mount Forest Hospital five hours later.

The victim was in his 28th year has been a resident of Mount Forest for a couple of years, and popular with everyone. Only last June he was wedded to Miss Margaret Norton of near Walter's Falls. Besides his widow and parents, two sisters in Timmins and Toronto will also mourn his untimely end.

TEN MILL TAX RATE FOR GREY CO. FOR 1939

A by-law confirming the 10-mill tax rate set for the county of Grey for 1939 was passed in Grey County on Friday afternoon. The 10-mill rate was set at the June session of the council.

Eight mills are collected for the general rate, two mills for school purposes. This is levied on the total equalized assessment of the county, which requires a total of \$248,155.47 to be raised for all purposes. This by-law set out the equalized assessment and the amount levied for general and school purposes on each as follows:

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Jury Dismisses Keopp Action for Damages

Following a four hours consideration of evidence and after a trial lasting a full day of the sitting of the Assizes which resumed on Monday afternoon in Owen Sound, the jury in the case of an action brought by Mr John Keopp, of Dornoch, acting on behalf of the estate of Harold Keopp, his 13-year-old son who was killed on December 4 last at Dornoch when struck by a truck driven by M. H. McKenzie, brought in a verdict dismissing the action.

Three questions dealing with the question of negligence, damages, if any, etc., were submitted to the jury, which took the view that the accident was unavoidable, and that the driver of the truck was not responsible.

Evidence showed that young Keopp, aged 13, was killed almost instantly as he was hit by the truck. The driver, McKenzie claimed that he did not see the lad until he flashed in front of the truck and thus had no opportunity of avoiding the accident. He stated that at time he was not travelling faster than 30 miles an hour. The evidence also showed that it had been snowing and that the right side of the windshield was covered with snow, so that he could only see through that part kept clear by the windshield wiper.

Mrs. Rutherford Appointed Co. Clerk
At the Friday afternoon session of Grey County Council, Mrs Audrey M. Rutherford, of Owen Sound, assistant Co. Clerk, was named County Clerk of Grey Co., at a salary of \$1700. Her appointment followed the death of her husband, Mr Fred Rutherford, who had been County Clerk for over 20 years.

There were some 12 to 15 applications for the position. Reeve D. J. McDonald, of Bentinck, chairman of the Com., had decided on a secret ballot, when Reeve Riley of Meaford, one of the applicants, voiced strong objection, demanding an open vote. Mr Riley claimed the secret ballot illegal, but was overruled by the warden and the chairman. Reeve W. S. Hunter of Durham and Reeve Austin Ball of Hanover were appointed scrutineers for the vote, and on announcing it in Mrs Rutherford's favor, the ballots were promptly destroyed. Reeve Riley was so incensed at the turn of affairs that he resigned his positions on the Sinking Fund Committee and the Bd of Managers of the Grey Co. Home. The Co. Council refused to accept the resignation. "This Council does not need to accept my resignation," said Mr Riley, "but neither need I act upon these committees."

Glenelg Forest Taxes to be Adjusted

When the report of the Grey County Reforestation Committee was presented and passed at County Council Thursday, Reeve John McGirr of Glenelg rose to the occasion with a protest on behalf of his municipality.

Reeve McGirr's protest had nothing to do with the report, which dealt with routine matters only. It was protesting loss of taxes due to the Grey County Forest, taken over this year by the County.

This land is now tax free, but the taxes must be paid for in the County rate. The taxes total \$137.66.

The Warden explained an adjustment would be made when the equalized assessment again comes up.

"You should have had the forest in Keppel and there would have been no trouble," commented Reeve Shier of Keppel, amid laughter which closed the incident.

The Reforestation Committee, incidentally, recommended in its report that a reforestation program between the county and the different municipalities be given consideration whereby the townships would retain certain suitable lots bought for taxes for reforestation purposes.

The county is to be responsible for the planting, fencing and all maintenance.

The Grey County Forest now has an official name. It is "The Springbank Forest."
