Dr. Burnett's Stolen Car Recovered

With the finding of \$1700 worth of loot in a hidden shack four miles north of King City, Simcoe County, were also found two stolen cars last Thursday. One of these was a Pontiac coach, identified by its serial number as Dr. Royden Burnett's car, which was stolen from his garage here a little over two weeks before. But it bore a sorry resemblance to its former self.

It had been taken to Barrie and Chief Scott and Prov Officer Oldfield of Palmerston brought it back to town to its owner. Over 3000 miles mileage had been put on since its theft; the motor was burned out, fenders dented and braced, spare tire and rim, and also the radio, removed from the car and sold. Dr. Burnett has no desire to run the car again, even after repairs, and expects the insurance adjuster on Thursday to inspect it and arrange settlement. Different markers had been placed on the car.

Prov Officers Hammer and Kirk of Shelburne were investigating stolen markers, when they stumbled on it's shack, hidden behind a clump of bushes, near King City. Unknown to the occupants, the officers peered through a window and saw clothing and cigarettes tossed about the floor, and three men sitting around a table. When police knocked, all three made a dash for liberty. One escaped into the bush, but two, Jack Garvey and Daniel Sandford of Toronto were captured, the former as he tried to jump into one of the two waiting cars there, with engines left running. Garvey and Sandford were handcuffed, and taken to Barrie jail, where they are held on nominal charges of vagrancy.

More than \$1000 worth of clothing and \$700 worth of cigarettes were found in the shack. The clothing was stolen from Murphy's clothing store, Alliston, while the cigarettes, carted away in three bags and a large box, were taken from the Mutual Supply stockroom at Arthur the same night as Dr. Burnett's car disappeared, one night before the Alliston robbery.

OBITUARY

HAMILTON ALLEN

One of Durham's best known and highly respected citizens, in the person of Hamilton Allen passed away Friday afternoon, when few were aware of his illness. He had been over town on Monday, but a cold developed into pneumonia which he was unable to overcome. The late Mr. Allen was in his seventy-fifth year, and was born in Alliston, the son of the late Mr and Mrs Joseph Allen. Here he learned his trade of blacksmith, later removing to Hopeville, where he engaged in the blacksmithing trade for twenty years, before removing to Durham thirty years ago, to begin business here. He sold out and retired from active work about ten years ago.

Over fifty years ago, in 1886, he was wedded to Miss Mary McKechnie, who survives to mourn his loss, with one daughter Bertha, Mrs Arthur Davis, of Edmonton, Alta. Mrs Davis arrived Monday before the funeral the following day, and will we learn, take her mother West with her, later.

The deceased was the youngest member of a family of twelve, his surviving brothers and sisters being Joseph Allen of Brandon; Mrs M. Davis and Mrs W. J. McFarlane of Glenelg; Mrs M. Hannah of Niagara Falls, Ont., and David Allen of Durham.

The late Mr. Allen served for two years as constable of the town, and for a short time in 1929 as town clerk, after the death of the late W. R. Vollet. He was a member of the Foursquare church here, which was fouled on Tuesday afternoon for the funeral service. Interment was made in Durham cemetery.

MRS ANNA BOGLE

A pioneer of this riding, Mrs John Bogle passed to her reward Thursday evening last at the home of her son William, north of Varney. For the last three months her health has been poor, but only for three days was she critically ill. Mrs Bogle was formerly Anna Gray, born in Glenelg township almost 80 years ago, and she has lived her full life in South Grey. Fifty-five years ago she married John Bogle, and for five years they farmed at Nenagh, thence nine years on the present John Kerr farm at Varney. They then purchased the farm to the north, where she has since resided. Thirteen years ago her husband passed away, a son James three years ago, and a daughter May in childhood. Only one son, William Bogle on the home farm survives.

The deceased was the last member of the Gray family. She was industrious and an excellent homemaker. She was a member of Durham Baptist Church and in health, a regular worshipper.

The funeral service was conducted on Saturday by her pastor, Rev. J. T. Priest. A private service was held in the home and the public service in the Baptist church. Mr. Priest took for his text from the prophecy of Zechariah, "At evening time it shall be light." Two favorite hymns of Mrs. Bogle's were sung "The Sands of Time are Sinking" and "The Day Thou Gavest is Ended." A duet, "Jesus is All the World to Me," was sung by Miss Eva Redford and Mrs W. Thropson. There was a tribute from the Baptist Church expressed in flowers and several from personal

friends. These were carried by four nephews, Thomas Sockett, Oscar Walls, Charles Wilson and William Nelson. The remains were laid to rest in Maplewood cemetery by three church officials W. D. Erwin, C. F. Kinnee and A. Holmes and three nephews, Walter and Gordon Bogle and William Gray.

The friends from a distance were Mr and Mrs John Bogle and Mr and Mrs Albert Bogle of Lisle, Mr and Mrs Gordon Bogle and Mr and Mrs Walter Bogle and Mrs Caretta, Preston, and several friends from Mount Forest and Ayton. There was a large number of friends and neighbors at the services in the church and cemetery.
