## Ford Garage Again Burglarized

Less than a month after it was broken into before the Ford Garage here was burglarized for a second time this fall on Monday morning. When the front door was forced open, \$56 in bills stolen from the vault, and car license cards and a rug carried away.

Constable Scott had passed the garage about 3 a.m., at which time there was no sign of any marauders, but on opening up Monday, there was ample evidence of their unwelcome visit. By prying and main force the main door had been opened, breaking the lock and splintering the side of the door frame in which the lock was fitted, up to the top. It was cash the bugulars sought, for the money was gone from the vault, which was part of the receipts of Saturday and Sunday. Fortunately a larger amount of cash of larger denominations had been hidden elsewhere, and this was intact. Papers were littered in office, and besides a rug taken from the show-rooms, the license cards of all cars in stock are the only other articles missed. Why the thieves should take these is puzzling, as they will be of no service to them, but decidedly inconvenient to Smith Bros., the proprietors.

As yet no trace of the daring burglars has been found. It is reported that an Arthur garage was robbed the same night.

### ALEXANDER McARTHUR

In Durham Hospital Tuesday evening, the death took place of one of our best-known and most popular residents, Alexander (Sandy) McArthur, son of the late Mr and Mrs McArthur, who lived on the 4th con. Glenelg. He took ill about a week ago, and spent only four or five days in hospital, succumbing to heart trouble.

"Sandy", as he was familiarly known, was born 67 years ago on con. 4, Glenelg, where he spent his boyhood days, and attended school at S. S. No. 3 (Edge Hill). After leaving the farm, he clerked in the store of his uncle, the late Chas. McArthur in Durham for several years and in 1904 went to Bruce Alberta to take care of his uncle Neil. He lived in this Western town nineteen years, then returned East fifteen years ago, since when he has lived at the old home on the 4th.

Surviving are five brothers and three sisters: Neil in Montana, Florida in South Dakota, Jim, Archie and Maggie at home; Mrs Duncan McLean (Jessie) near by; Hugh on con. 6, Glenelg; John at Bruce, Alta. One sister, Mrs Wesley Williams, died some years ago.

The deceased was a genial, broad-minded man, well liked by everyone, the soul of honor and integrity, and he will be deeply missed by the whole community. In politics he was a Liberal, until the last few years, when he joined the U.F.O. In religion he was a Baptist. His pastor, Rev. J. T. Priest will have charge of the funeral service on Thursday, Dec. 8th, from the old home at 2.00 p.m. Interment will be made in Durham cemetery. The pallbearers will be Arthur Robinson, Herb Allen, Ernest Blodgett, Robert McGilivray, Thos. Cock and W. J. Greenwood.

At Durham Council session, Monday night, a bylaw was passed fixing date of annual nomination for Friday, Dec. 23rd at 7.30 p.m. Should a poll be necessary, it will be held on Monday, Jan. 2nd, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. as follows: North ward, Public Library; Mal. McCallum, D.R.O., V. Elvidge, poll clerk. East ward, at Hahn House: Ernest McDonald, D.R.O., Geo. Barnett, poll clerk. West ward, at Town Hall: D. Adlam, D.R.O., Peter Hay, poll clerk.

The resignation of Dr. J. L. Smith, as Medical Officer of Health for many years, was received, and accepted by the Council with regret. A bylaw was passed, naming Dr. Royden R. Burnett as his successor.

A Communication from the National Milk Producers and Consumers Association, Kitchener, was received, advocating petitioning the Gov't removing the Act compelling all milk offered for sale in urban municipalities to be pasteurized. They did not condemn pasteurization, but objected to its compulsory feature. Council filed the letter, taking no action.

General accounts totalling \$923.50 were passed, Nov. relief acts of \$51.03, and an extra relief act of \$41.65, which is charged to City of Hamilton.

Coun. McQueen reported grading done on streets, and sand hauled, ready for applying on slippery roads. The Bell Telephone Co. was granted permission to erect a pole on west side of Queen St. between Chester and George Sts.

The Band was granted use of the Town Hall for practise during winter months.

The smoke and odor nuisance emanating from the Longworth factory, is still a burning problem. The Clerk was instructed to write to other towns, and ascertain what had been done to alleviate such nuisances.
