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Feick Committed for Trial Before a Jury

Several actions were settled or adjourned before Magistrate Sperman in Police Court here on Friday. Henry Feick of Clifford who was charged with reckless driving in the accident at Letter Breen, Nov. 29th when Wm. Evans of Mt. Forest was fatally injured, elected to be tried by a jury and was committed for trial. Two sureties gave bail of \$1500 each.

John Grierson, Bentinck and Joseph Daly of Mt. Forest both pleaded guilty to a charge of driving in a manner dangerous to the public, as a result of their accident some three weeks ago, when driving without lights purposely in the dense fog their cars collided on No. 6 highway. The minimum fine of \$5 and costs each was imposed amounting to \$7.75 and \$10.85 and licenses suspended for 19 days. Daly also paid a \$10 and costs fine totalling \$11.95 for driving without a license.

Francis Zureit, a 16 year old Hanover lad, pleaded guilty to stealing money out of numerous milk bottles in Hanover last summer, and attempting to defraud a merchant there, of shoes and socks, by telling a yarn he was working at Knechtel's. The boy skipped out last July and lately returned. He will be remanded for sentence until Jan. 12th in Hanover.

Before Magistrate Sperman at adjourned Court on Wednesday, Bert Boyd, stock salesman of Mt. Forest, was sentenced to \$200 and costs or two months in jail. He chose the jail term.

Clarence Watt and Jack Lloyd were each given three months suspended sentence, on a \$100 bond.

Judgment for Plif. in Holstein Car Collision

An aftermath of a collision on the main street of Holstein over a year ago, when a Plymouth sedan driven by Milton Aitken collided against a truck driven by J. J. Stephenson, (which had just driven out of his lane), was staged in Durham Division Court on Tuesday before His Honor Judge Morley. Stephenson sued for \$90 damages to his truck; Aitken admitted some liability and had offered \$43, but after hearing several witnesses on both sides, judgment was given Stephenson for \$66.53 and costs.

She was a member of Knox Church Normanby, and her pastor, Rev. Mr Kaye, will have charge of the funeral service at the home at 1.00 p.m. on Thursday. Interment will be made in Hampden cemetery.

MRS JOHN BURNS

Only four days after her husband's death, Mrs John Burns of town passed away last Saturday morning, at the age of 78 years. She had been slightly over a week ill, and succumbed to a heart attack.

Mrs Burns was formerly Ellen McAuliffe one of a family of five sons and five daughters of the late David McAuliffe and Margaret Jones. She was born on the present Smallman farm in Northeast Normanby, and attended school at S.S. No. 1. Thirty-nine years ago she was wedded to John Burns, who died on Tuesday of last week. Most of their married life was spent on the farm, lot 30, con. 4, Bentinck. Six years ago they retired, moving into Durham. Surviving are an only son, David of town, and his two children, also her five brothers and two sisters, Mrs M. McGrath (Catherine) and Mrs Friend (Annie) of Toronto; John McAuliffe of Detroit; Dan. of Glenelg; David Michael and Ed. of Durham. Mrs Friend of Toronto was here the last week and tenderly cared for her sister in her closing days, and only illness of her life time.

The deceased was a faithful member of St. Peter's R. C. Church, where the funeral service was held on Monday morning, conducted by Rev. Father Ryan, and interment made in St. John's cemetery. The pall-bearers were J. D. and A. D. McAuliffe, Wm. and Jim Sullivan, Lawrence and Vincent McKeown.
