Goals and More Goals, when Durham Beats Hanover

29 goals scored in a single hockey games, 12 of them in one period,—what do you think of that? Think what you like, the final count was Durham 15, Hanover 10, here last Friday night, and the Review scribe almost ran out of paper keeping tab on the superabundance of shots which lodged in the nets.

Durham's goalie, the champion team of three winter's ago—Jack Schutz, was back in harness, and he was given a hot reception. He was spry enough to block many shots, while 10 eluded him. But even hotter was the bombardment accorded Hanover's goalie, Lamont, who after 11 shots had beat him in first two periods, gave way to Winkler, and Durham banged in 8 more past him in the last 20 minutes.

Both teams elected to play the game inside of the other's blue line if at all possible, consequently much of the play was around the nets, and Durham proved more expert in this gangling style of play than the visitors. Strengthening the local line-up were two others of the 1936 champion team—Clarence McGirr, who came out of retirement since 1937, and Irving Elvidge, whose first appearance it was this winter. Both added to the power on the attack and figured in the scoring. Harry Kress played a smart game, scoring thrice, while Bert Lawrence and Gordon McGirr were also very effective, scoring some pretty goals.

It was wide-open hockey all through, and the crowd began to get dizzy keeping track of the count in a dizzy game. As a little extra spice, Moses, and Paterson of Hanover started a free-for-all in last period which looked as though it might spread, but the combatants were parted and penalized, and order restored before anything serious happened.
