Household Hints

A large wooden button mould sewn into the corner of a dish-cloth will be found useful when cleaning enamel saucers.

Tighten the sagging cane of a chair by washing in hot water and drying in a strong draught.

A good dustless duster is made by soaking old knitted underwear in kerosene for 24 hours and drying thoroughly.

For appearance sake and to prevent injury to the hands, rub the edges of chipped crockery smooth with emery paper.

After washing cut-glass in warm soapy water, rinse in strong blue water. This will make it easier to polish and gives a sparkling brightness.

To shred soap finely, use a grater instead of a knife.

Clean a red brick fireplace by applying a paste made of Venetian red and water.

One way to prevent the bottom crust of custard or pumpkin pie from becoming soggy is to brush it all over lightly with beaten egg white before adding the filling.

When starching dark colored clothes tint the starch a bit to prevent it from showing white on the dark fabric. Use commercial tints, or bluing for color with a blue cast; coffee for dark browns.

Keep a supply of bouillon cubes on your pantry shelf to add to stews, gravies and meat soups which do not have an appetizing brown color. And they add flavor as well.

Fannie Hurst, Celebrated Novelist, On Visit to Canada Advises Them to Get Together For Common Good

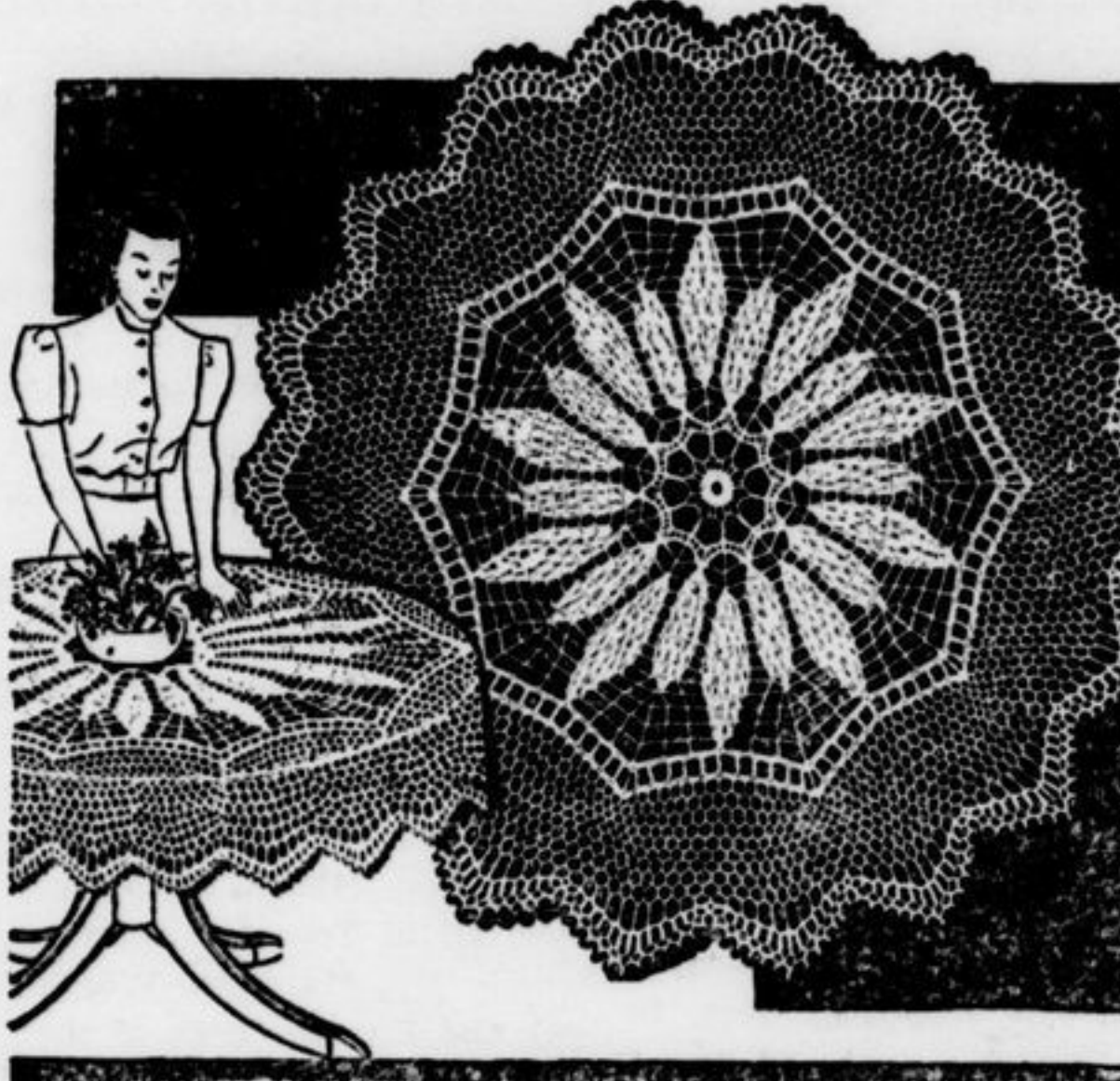
Expressing hope that the word "feminist" would "sink into oblivion," Fannie Hurst, celebrated novelist, of New York, on a visit to Canada last week said that women had grasped opportunities in the present age to forge to the front in various fields of human endeavor.

It is much more exhilarating to be a woman than to be a man today, despite handicaps still existing, Miss Hurst said. This age has seen the first woman flier, the first woman cabinet minister, the first woman minister to a foreign government and the first foreigner of a state.

"Harnessed" To Be Effective

Women represent a power that is like a great river — a power that must be "harnessed" to be effective, she said. The great strides forward which have been made by the world have been the result of making masses of the people conscious of their power, she said, adding that women likewise must unite for the common good.

MOST POPULAR PIE
Here is a dessert for which we do not hesitate to repeat the recipe at least annually. Because Coconut Cream Pie is, has been, and probably will continue to be, about the most popular pie among men, we make no apology for giving you this delicious version of it.

COCONUT CREAM PIE
4 tablespoons sugar
5 tablespoons cake flour
¼ teaspoon salt
2 cups milk
3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
1½ cups coconut, premium shred
2 teaspoons vanilla
1 baked 9-inch pie shell
2 egg whites, unbeaten
½ cup sugar
Dash of salt
2 tablespoons water
¼ teaspoon vanilla.

Combine sugar, flour and salt in top of double boiler; add milk and egg yolks, mixing thoroughly. Place over rapidly boiling water and cook 10 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from boiling water; add 1 cup coconut and vanilla. Cool slightly; then turn into pie shell.

Place egg whites, sugar, salt and water in top of double boiler; beat with rotary egg beater until thoroughly mixed. Place over rapidly boiling water and beat 1 minute; then remove from fire and continue beating 1 minute, or until mixture stands in peaks. Add flavouring. Pile lightly on filling. Sprinkle with remaining coconut. Serve at once.

Three sliced bananas, or 1½ cups thinly sliced dates, may be added to this recipe. Place ½ of fruit in pie shell; then add filling. Arrange remaining fruit around meringue; sprinkle with coconut.

PIE CRUST
2½ cups sifted cake flour
½ teaspoon salt
2/3 cup cold shortening
1/3 cup cold water (about).

Sift flour once, measure, add salt and sift again. Cut in shortening until pieces are about the size of small peas. Add water, a small amount at a time, mixing lightly with fork. Handle as little as possible. Wrap in waxed paper, chill thoroughly. Roll out on slightly floured board. For pie shell, use ½ recipe. Line a 9-inch pie plate with pastry, rolled 1/8 inch thick, allowing pastry to extend 1 inch beyond edge. Fit loosely on plate. Fold edge back to form standing rim; flute with fingers. Line with large piece of waxed paper and fill with rice or beans to hold shape; or prick shell with fork. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 10 minutes; then remove paper with rice, and continue baking 5 minutes, or until browned. Bake pricked shell 15 minutes.
