Durham opened scoring when Joe Noble rushed to near nets and gave R. McGirr a neat pass close in. Capstick evened it up when his long drive from centre ice beat E. McDonald.

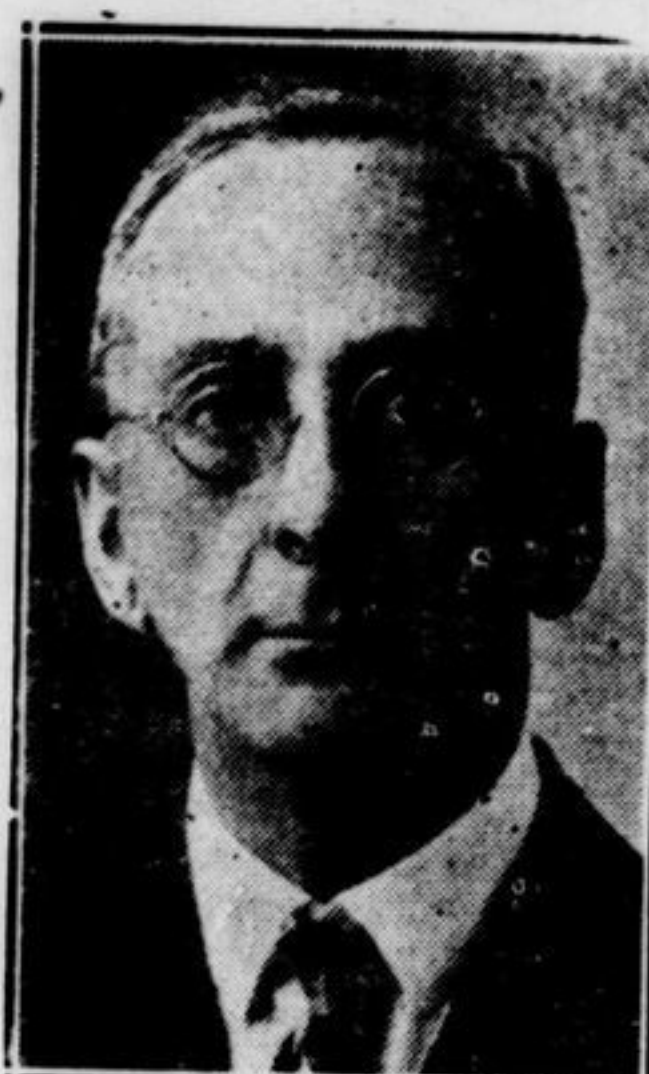

Annual Meeting of Durham Presbyterian Church

The annual congregational meeting of Durham Presbyterian Church was held in the school room on Friday evening, February 3rd with a good representation of the congregation.

Rev. S. W. Hirtle opened the meeting with devotional exercises and also acted as chairman for the meeting. The secretary, Mr Gordon Geddes read the minutes of the previous meetings.

The reports of the various organizations were received and adopted and indicated a favorable advancement, especially the Sunday School which has had a record year, this being the best year since 1931.

Our budget allocation has been met with a surplus, thus making us the leading church in the Saugeen Presbytery, of which Rev. S. W. Hirtle is convener of the Budget Committee and a member of the General Board of Missions.

One of the outstanding events in the history of our church was the burning of the mortgage in June, at which Rev. S. W. Hirtle was assisted by two former ministers, Rev. B. D. Armstrong, and Rev. David Gowdy and the Moderator and Clerk of Presbytery.

Thirty-six were admitted into full communicant membership. The rite of baptism was administered to ten children, and there were six weddings.

A two minute silence was observed in memory of members and adherents who have been called to a higher service. Special mention to Dr Donald McArthur who has been a trustee since 1926 and whose loyalty and faithfulness to the church was of incalculable value.

Mr. J. H. McFadyen was elected to fill this vacancy. Auditors elected were Lorne Alteson and Boyce Howell.

The retiring managers are: Wm. McDonald, John McEachern, Arthur Edge W. J. McFadden, John Alexander, Gordon Geddes and T. M. McFadden. These elected for a three years term are: W. J. McFadden, Wm. McDonald, John Alexander, Dr. Pickering and Arthur Edge, and those for two years were: Douglas Donnelly and Gordon Greenwood.

A vote of appreciation was extended to Rev. and Mrs. Hirtle in their untiring efforts, also to the choir and other organizations of the church.

Rev. R. Heneymaa closed the meeting with the benediction, after which lunch was served.

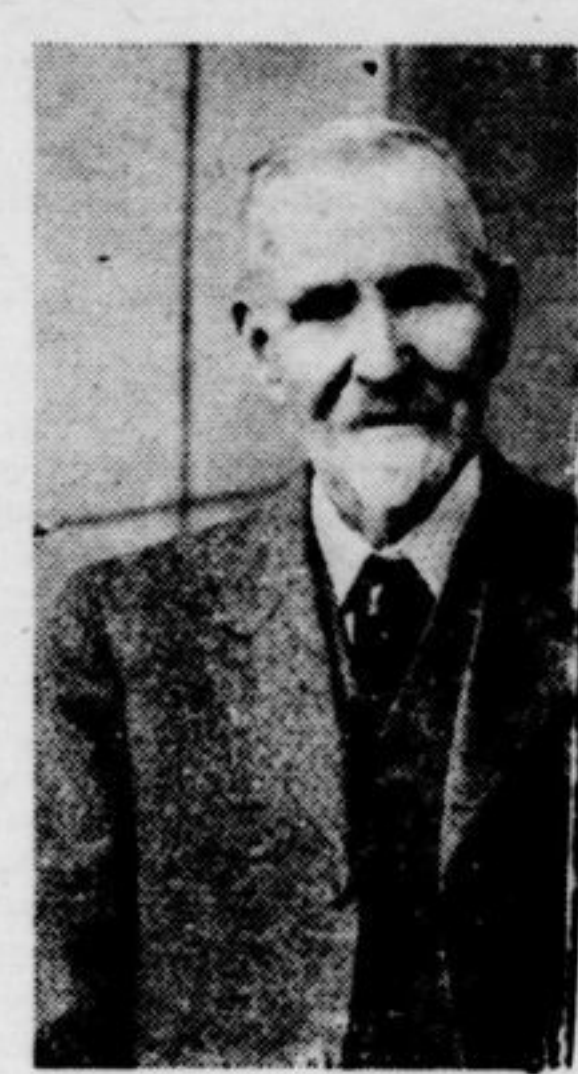

Town Will Sue for Business Taxes

With some \$11,000 or \$12,000 on the list of arrears of taxes, Durham Council deems it too high, and considered each case individually at Monday night's session. Where the delinquent is making regular payments, or making an effort to pay, no action will be taken. Council decided however, to enter suit for all business taxes in arrears after March 1st next, and to list all properties with three years or more of taxes in arrears, and arrange another tax sale later in the year.

A request from the Business Men's Association for use of town hall for meetings monthly, on second Friday, was granted.

Requests for grants for Salvation Army and Muskoka Hospital were filed. The Reeve explained that the County now gives a larger grant to Salvation Army which covers all municipalities in County. Chairman McKay of Board of Works reported all roads and walks kept in as good shape as possible for this time of year.

The report of Dr. Burnett, M.O.H. stated no communicable diseases in the town, and general health satisfactory. Reeve Hunter gave a brief talk on Public School affairs and intimated that a more detailed report will be presented the coming year.
