## Ancient Remedies Ofter Modernized

Streamlined Version of Old Boiled Tea Cure For Burns And Scalds Is Adapted to Today's Use.

Modern pharmacy researches sometimes streamline ancient remedies, Dean R. O. Hurst of the Ontario College of Pharmacy said in an address at Parkdale Collegiate in Toronto this week, pointing out that the ancient Chinese used an infusion of tea leaves for burns and scalds. Boiling six teaspoons of tea in six cups of water for ten minutes makes an infusion containing - from 16 to 27 per cent, of tannin.

"This infusion used with a compress of six layers of gauze is one of the most efficaceous and soothing remedies for minor burns and scalds," he said,

He added that in case of severe burns or scalds the first thing to do is call a physician. But for many minor domestic accidents of this kind a more modern form of the old remedy is available.

"Nowadays you can buy tannic acid (a powder) cheaply. One ounce of this added to a pint of water which has been boiled for ten minutes is convenient for many applications. Still more convenient is tannic acid jelly or ointment. These can be bought from any pharmacist and are recommended because they help assure cleaner healing of the burn or scald," the dean explaind.

## Claims Redskins Migrated From South America

North American Indian May Have Come From There To This Continent - Blenheim Minister Finds Clue In Pottery Near Clearville, Ont.

He has found what he believes is a definite link between the natives of Kent County and Indians of Peru.

Similar Designs Imprinted The entire Millar theory is based on the fact that the Indians had trade-marks similar to those of business firms today. Each tribe, according to the minister, had a different mark which members used on pottery. ... It was in fact a piece of Peruvian pottery which first started Mr. Millar on his hobby.

A friend presented him with a huaca taken from a grave in Peru several years ago and which bore the tribal mark of the prince with whom it was buried. The marking consisted of a number of angular lines. Some time later he discovered pottery near Clearville a few miles from Blenheim, on which a similar design had been imprinted.

## National Aid For Students Is Advocated

Paul Martin, M.P., For Essex East, Urges a System of Scholarships For Brilliant But Needy Canadians.

The government should investigate the desirability of a system of national scholarships for outstanding students who are financially unable to continue their education, according to a resolution, sponsored by Paul Martin, Liberal, Essex East, appearing in the House of Commons votes and proceedings.

The scholarships would enable the students to obtain undergrdauate or post graduate training in universities, agricultural colleges and technical schools.

"Help Brightest Young People" "The important industrial nations of the world are spending large sums annually in scholarship systems to ensure that the most brilliant of their boys and girls may not be prevented, because of a lack of financial resources, from securing adequate academic training to enable them to take their proper place as thoroughly trained leaders in industrial, professional and public life of their respective countries," the resolution said.

"In this age of scientific advance in all walks of life, Canada cannot afford to ignore longer and lose the tremendous asset which it possesses in the latent ability for trained leadership of the brightest of her young people."
