ORITTIARY NORMAN ALFRED McLEOD Norman Alfred McLeod, 820 Twenty-fifth Avenue, N. W. Calgary, Alberta, died in his fifty-fifth year, in the Calgary General Hospital, on Feb. 7th, after a lengthy illness. Surviving are: one son Jas D McLeod, Vancouver; two sisters, Miss Gertrude McLeod and Margaret, Mrs James McKie, both of Calgary; one brother, Donald of Vancouver. Norman McLeod was the youngest son of the late Rev. Donald McLeod of Priceville. Funeral services were conducted by Rev J. Rex Brown on Feb 9. The pall bearers were: Mr R. E. MacLachlan and James Burnett once of Priceville, F. H. Russell and E. Young of Calgary. Many friends of Priceville and vicinity will remember Norman McLeod and his cheerful spirit, in spite of constant ill health. DR. O. E. CARR Dr. Osborne Elliot Carr, Owen Sound Medical Officer of Health since January 16th of this year, passed away late on Thursday afternoon as the result of a stroke he suffered about noon the previous day. He was seized with an attack of the flu one day last week and was confined to his home, but it was thought he was getting along nicely until Wednesday when he was seized suddenly and later became unconscious, after which he sank rapidly until the end on Thursday. He was in his 63rd year. Following his appointment as Medical Officer of Health for the City of Owen Sound he announced his intention of giving up his medical practice altogether and devoting his entire time to public health work and he expressed himself as being pleased with this opportunity of serving the people of the community in that capacity. He was intensely interested in the work and hoped for great things having mapped out a program for the year which would occupy all his time. His death marks the third Medical Officer of Health for Owen Sound to pass on inside of the past year. Dr. H. G. Murray, who held the position for many years, died in March, and his successor, Dr Frank Campbell, died suddenly in the early part of December last. The late Dr. Carr was born at Woodford, attended Collegiate and Model School in Owen Sound, taught at Walter's Falls a short time and graduated in both Arts and Medicine from Toronto University. When the Great War broke out in 1914 he promptly offered his services as a medical officer, and they were accepted. He went overseas with the 1st Canadian Expeditionary Force, and served as a medical officer during the entire duration of the war. As a result of these services his health was impaired to some extent, but he took up practice of his profession at Priceville, where he remained for three years, and then came to Owen Sound, and was appointed M.O.H. for the township of Sydenham, which position he held at time of his death. He took an active part in the affairs of the Canadian Legion, and was also a prominent member of the Masonic order, and at the time of his death was Immediate Past Master of St. George's Lodge, No. 88, A. F. & A. M. He was held in high esteem by the members of the medical profession in the city and throughout the district, both as a practitioner and a gentleman. He was married 14 years ago to

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
