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OBITUARY

REV. M. M. BENNETT DIED IN TORONTO

The death took place in Toronto General Hospital on Sunday, March 12th, of Rev. Melvin Bennett, father of Mr. Emmerson J. Bennett of Durham, and a former active pastor in the Methodist and United Churches, after a serious illness.

The late Mr. Bennett was president of the Saskatchewan Conference for a term and for four years a member of the General Mission Board of the Methodist Church. He served as pastor of congregations in Regina, Saskatoon, Yellowgrass and Yorkton in Saskatchewan before coming back to Ontario, where he was pastor of Wincham United Church until his retirement in 1927. Upon his retirement, he took up residence in London, and supplied in churches in that city, lately removing to Toronto. Last summer, during Rev. W. H. Smith's absence on holidays, he ably filled the pulpit of Knox United Church, Durham, for two Sundays. He had been spending the winter in Florida, but when taken seriously ill there, returned to Toronto.

Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Bennett of town left Sunday morning for Toronto, to be with his father in his closing hours.

The deceased was first married to Miss Cooper of Melbourne, who died a number of years ago. Later he was married to Miss Madeline McLachlan of Toronto, who survives him; also two sons, Wesley B. Bennett, Emerson J. of Durham, and one daughter, Kathleen of Toronto.

DEATH OF JOHN MULLEN

After a week's illness, John Mullen died on Saturday last, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Heft, (opposite his own home, just east of Durham) in his 83rd year. Only on Feb. 22nd last, his sister Mary passed away, and he is the last of the family of the late Peter and Mary Walsh Mullen. Deceased was born in Pultineh Township, near Guelph, came up to Normandy, and 2nd con. N. D. R. Glenelg in young manhood days, and thirty-five years ago, removed with his sister who recently predeceased him, to the outskirts of Durham.

The funeral service was held on Monday morning in St. Peter's R. C. Church, requiem mass being sung by Rev. Father Ryan. The pall-bearers were Lawrence, Vincent, and Malcolm McKeown, J. D. McAniff, Milfred Wannamaker, David Burns. The remains were laid to rest in St. John's Cemetery, Glenelg Centre.

WILLIAM BURNETT

Mr. Angus Hooper, Glenelg, received word that his brother-in-law, William Burnett, had died at his home in Engadine, Michigan, on Sunday, March 5th. He was a native of Glenelg, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Burnett, and was in his 69th year. He is the last of his family and a cousin of Messrs Robert and George Burnett of Durham.

In 1896 he married May Hooper, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hooper of Glenelg who predeceased him 14 years ago. Two sons and a daughter survive: Joseph and David of Engadine, and Mrs. Harry Keszley (Margaret) of Detroit.

The remains are resting in a vault at Engadine, and will be brought to the end of the month to Glenelg, for burial in Ebenezer cemetery.

Rev. Dr. Farquharson Passes Former Pres. Pastor Here

Many old friends in Durham and community were saddened to learn of the death of Rev. Dr. William Farquharson at his home in Toronto on Monday morning, after less than a week's illness, in his 86th year. He had been able to go around, and attend church, and do as he wished until the Tuesday previous. Two or three years ago Dr. Farquharson had a critical illness, when his life was despaired of, but he made a surprising rally, and enjoyed good health until the last few days. His daughter, Miss Jessie writes, "He was very much pleased with his trip to Durham last fall, and has always been happy with his friends from Durham, who are so kind in enquiring for him, and remembering him from time to time."

Dr. Farquharson was born in Cromar, Aberdeenshire, Scotland, coming with his parents to Canada as a boy in 1866, travelling on a vessel powered partly by sail and partly by steam. The family settled near Chatham, and William took naturally to books and study. He graduated from Toronto University in 1883 with honors in Philosophy, and three years later finished his Theological course at Knox College. He was ordained as a Presbyterian minister at Dover in the Chatham Presbytery, from which he was translated to Claude and Mayfield in Peel County. In 1899 he received and accepted a call to Durham Presbyterian church, and here he labored for fourteen years, beloved by his own congregation, and held in the highest regard by all denominations. A break-down in health forced his resignation here in November 1913, his last pastorate. After a rest of two years in Agincourt he was appointed immigration Chaplain representing the Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist and Congregational Churches at the ports of Quebec and St. John, New Brunswick, which office he retained till his retiring from active service in 1929. Since then he has made his home in Toronto.

In 1898, he received from Knox College on examination, the degree of B. D., and ten years later while in Durham, was honored by receiving from his Alma Mater the honorary degree of D. D..

Shortly after his ordination, he married Annie McDonald Couits, of Tilbury East, who proved a loyal and faithful life partner, predeceasing him in 1929 after a long illness. To them were born one daughter and six sons, three of whom passed away many years ago. Surviving are Miss Jessie Y., public health school nurse in East York, who resided with her father; Dr. Charles G. of Agincourt; Dr. Ray F., of Young's farm, and Robert a herd of Pure bred Herefords, to be Allan Couits, of the Globe and kept there.

School Children Will Get Trees

For the first time in Grey County school fair history, reforestation measures are being introduced with the distribution of a variety of wind-break and forest trees to the school children, in addition to the usual grain and flower seeds.

The trees listed are: White, red, Jack and Scotch pines; white spruce, white ash, rock elm, elm, hard and soft maple, basswood, Carolina poplar (cuttings or rooted), white willow, white and red oak, balsam, hemlock, larch, Norway spruce, walnut and butternut, twenty-two varieties in all.

There are five thousand children enrolled in twenty school fair centres and if each child takes his or her allotment of five trees, reforestation will be greatly aided.

Besides these trees for the school children there are seventy-two branches of Women's Institutes in the county that will receive a large allotment of windbreak and forestry varieties. The introduction of this institute feature was made in 1938 and thousands of trees were planted.

At the morning service of Knox United Church Sunday, Robert Davidson, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. T. R. McFadden, and Geraldine Ann, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Ledingham, received the rite of baptism.

PERSONAL MENTION

William McDonald Passes; Well-Known Chesley Editor

Chesley's most distinguished citizen, editor William McDonald of the Enterprise, died early on Wednesday morning, following a stroke a few hours previously. He was in his 77th year, and though an invalid from a stroke since five years ago, his mind was still vigorous, and he kept well posted on all local and world events. While bedfast, he continued weekly to furnish local and editorial copy for his paper.

He was a school teacher for 18 years before buying the Enterprise in 1891, and he has since guided its destinies, latterly with his son John C. as junior partner. He was secretary of Chesley High School Board from 1904 until taken ill, served his town as Reeve, served Bruce County as Warden in 1905, and as a member of the Ontario Legislature for eight years, 1911 to 1919. Mrs. McDonald predeceased him a year ago. The funeral will be held on Friday afternoon, with interment in Chesley cemetery.

WELL KNOWN ENTERTAINER GONE

The death of John H. Cameron in Toronto last Wednesday, will be regretted by many who enjoyed his talent as an elocutionist, humorist and monologist. He has several times appeared on the concert platform in Durham and vicinity; his entertainment was always clean and attracted a good audience. He was born in Owen Sound over 80 years ago and there are few places in the province he has not visited, during his many years in public life.
