**Piped Light**

THE child who swallows a penny, or his parent who just has a plain sore throat, will soon find their physician better equipped to cope with the emergency.

New surgical instruments which can carry light around curves, permitting illumination of any affected inner part of the body, were introduced recently to the American College of Surgeons, and are now being made in Canada. The new tools of medicine are made of a plastic material called "Lucite" methyl methacrylate, the tongue-twisting designation arising from its chemical constituents.

Clear as glass, it has the peculiar property of transmitting light throughout the entire length of a rod, so that the electric bulb supplying it can be in the handle of the instrument, rather than actually at its end, inside the patient's body, as has previously been the case.

Thus the lower tip of the instrument, down in the throat, can be made to shine with a brilliant light, to illuminate the entire tract, and by frosting any part of the surface, the beams can be released not only at the end but on whatever area can best light the surgeon's work. Heat, glare or electric shock, which naturally accompany a lighted bulb inserted into the body, are also eliminated in the new instrument, the source being far away from the lighted end.

The characteristic of the material which permits the light-transmission is a peculiar optical property, according to chemists who spent years of research in its development. The rays of light, travelling up the interior of the rod literally "bounce" as they strike the highly-polished sides. Being unable to penetrate the inner shaft until they reach the end.

**Priceville Win Championship of the Semi Pro League**

Hail to Priceville Hockey Club! 1939 champions of the Semi-Pro League. From only a small village, without a rink for practice and training, the team played its home games in Flesherston, and fought its way over all rivals to capture the top rung, and the John McDougall trophy. The late Mr. McDougall of Priceville vicinity donated the trophy to the league, and it is fitting that his home team should win it for the first time.

In the play-off series, best 3 out of 5, Priceville and Flesherston were opponents. Flesherston won the first two games and looked to have a strangle-hold on the title. The turning point of the series was Priceville's decision to transfer the third game, their second home game, to Durham rink. Here, with their backs to the wall, Priceville pulled out their first victory by a 2-0 score. Next game in Flesherston was the test, but Priceville having tasted victory, were undaunted, and won it by a score 3-2 score to tie up the series at two games each.

Before a packed house in Markdale Friday night for the fifth and deciding game, Priceville clearly outplayed their rivals to win by 5 to 1, their third straight victory. Johnny McVicar with 3 goals and an assist, was foremost for Priceville in a fast and cleanly played game, only one penalty (to McLean) being given. McMeekin played a smart game in the nets, while R. Johnston and Teeter were Flesherston's best. Teeter, speediest and most dangerous shot of the league, was closely checked, but scored their only goal.

**TEA A POPULAR BEVERAGE**

Tea is the most popular beverage in Canada, Chinese legend has it that its virtues were discovered nearly 4,700 years ago. The earliest reference to it in European literature was found towards the end of the 16th century. First used as a medicine, it later became popular as a drink. Today it serves both purposes.

The first tea was brought from the East to Europe in 1610 by the Dutch East India Company. Soon afterwards it was introduced into Great Britain, mainly as a curiosity, and it caught the fancy of the fashionable world. The price then ranged from about \$30 to \$50 a pound. The first sale of tea in England was advertised in 1658 the price by that time having dropped to less than \$15 a pound.

Tea grew in popularity during the 17th and 18th century, when it was still known as the "China drink." Early in the 19th century the centre of the tea industry shifted from China to India, Ceylon and the Netherlands East Indies, and the drinking of Indian tea became popular.
