## AS LONG AS POSSIBLE

> A regular annual pruning is proferred to a heavy pruning every three or four years. A heavy pruning upsets the balance of the tree as is indicated by an abnormal growth of suckers. It may throw condition. In removing suckers, the cuts should be made flush with the parent limb else a second crop may arise next year from the same point. Many fruit growers begin to wor-

ry too scon about their trees getting too high, and commence quite early to reduce height. This often results in a strong growth at the top of the tree, causing excessive shading of the lower areas, weakening the practically nil. Only one buyer came growth there and eventually resulting in dead branches.

until they are too high for profitable management. It is an easy matter to reduce the height by cutting to sturdy outward growing limb. This height reduction process should spread over two or three years that the balance between growth and fruiting may not be upset.
