Pres. Young People In Conference

Rev. H. V. Mills, Theme Speaker—Molly McIntyre, Soloist—Miss Bessie McMurchy, Missionary on Furlough from Central India—Ernie Young and Charlie Cunningham, Song Leaders, and Banquet were Features of the Occasion.

Despite the falling of rain the representatives from the various societies of Saugeen and other presbyteries assembled at the Presbyterian Church to participate in the second Weekend Conference to be sponsored by the local Presbyterian Young People's Society, under the capable guidance of Dan Firth, 1st Prov. Vice President. It was an outstanding event as we met our old friends, "smiling Ernie" (Moak), "solemn John" (Stephens), "Jolly Rev. Mr. Mills", "happy Elsie" (Thomson), Charlie Cunningham and other friends from distant presbyteries. The farthest distant representative came from Chatham, Miss McGeorge.

About 6.30 the happy delegates assembled in the church basement, which was beautifully decorated for the occasion in Presbytery colors, "Red and White", to partake of a bountiful banquet of good things to eat which was served by the Ladies' Aid of the local Church. After all had eaten sufficient, (or maybe a little more) the toastmaster of the evening called the gathering to order.

The toastmaster, Mr. Daniel Firth, proposed the toast to His Majesty the King, which was responded to by the singing of the National Anthem; the next toast to the Church was proposed by Miss Luella Barber, Church and Presbytery by the Rev. Mr. Hirtle replied. Greetings were extended to the gathering from the Church and Presbytery by Rev. S. W. Hirtle; the town by Mayor Bell, who spoke about the responsibility of the young people of today in the preservation of the Sabbath Day to keep it Holy; the Provincial Executive by John Stephens; the B. Y. P. U. by Lucille Trafford; the U. Y. P. U. by Norman Greenwood; the local society by Gordon Greenwood; Toronto Presbytery, by Mina Kitson; Hamilton Presbytery by Elsie Thompson; Guelph Presbytery, Donald Clark; Chatham Presbytery by Miss McGeorge; and Bruce Presbytery by Mervyn Hamilton of Chesley. Rev. Mr. Mills made his introductory theme address which proved very interesting and inspirational. A skit "Pat's Matrimonial Adventure" presented by Misses Jean Firth, C. McMeekin and E. Ledingham, concluded the evening's program at the church. This was followed by a recreational period in the Town Hall under the capable supervision of Misses Jean Firth and Elsie Miller. About 11.30 the delegates started in search of their hostesses' homes wishing for either "rubber boots" or "water wings".

On Sunday morning at 9.30 the session began with the service of Holy Communion conducted by Rev. Mr. Hirtle. The regular Sunday morning service had Rev. Mr. Mills as the theme speaker. He was assisted by members of Executive. "I like my Bible," quipped the speaker, "because it frankly exposes facts that I know are true." He also stated that it was the young

people of this age and generation that should strive to make Sunday as God would have it. Miss Molly McIntyre, Toronto, rendered a beautiful solo. Mrs Gordon Greenwood acted as pianist during the conference, assisted by a Young People's choir.

At 2.30 the afternoon sessions were opened by a Song Service conducted by Ernie Moody. Miss Sadie McDuchern capably conducted the Worship Service. This was followed by discussion groups as follows: Administration, by John Stephens, Pres. Prov. P. Y. P. S.; Leadership Training by Elsie Thomson, Prov. D. L. T.; also groups conducted by Sadie McDuchern, Viola Murray, and Margaret Stevenson. The Open Forum was conducted by Douglas Dodge.

At 5.30 the Ladies' Aid served a buffet supper which was of an excellent standard of cooking. At the evening service the theme speaker, Rev. Mr. Mills gave an excellent address on "A Look". Miss Molly McIntyre again rendered a beautiful solo.

The climax of the Conference was in the form of a Fellowship Hour at which Charlie Cunningham conducted the Song Service. Miss Bessie McMurchy, a Missionary home on furlough from the Bhil Mission, Field in Central India, was the speaker. She very vividly revealed the true sense of missionary need in the foreign fields. Rev. Mr. Hirtle concluded the Conference with prayer and benediction.

A. Sharpe Wins only Div. Court Action

The only case to come up for trial before His Honour Judge Morley at Division Court sittings here on Tuesday, was Alfred Sharpe, Durham, vs. High Foster, of Egremont, five miles east of Mount Forest. Foster built a new house last summer, and had purchased saw-wood and doors, window frames, etc., from Mr. Sharpe's mill here.

Foster and his son Clarence built the house, and paid for all materials secured from Sharpe except a balance of \$29.65, which they refused to pay claiming some of the lumber was defective, not being No. 1 white pine as specified, also that the frames did not fit properly. Mr. Sharpe testified that No. 1 white pine had been specified, but this cannot be secured free from knots. He supplied good materials and had made frame, etc., exactly in accordance with measurements furnished him. Lorne McNally and Albert Pierce were witnesses for plaintiff, while deft's son Clarence and a neighbor, Mr. Brown gave evidence for defence.

Mr. Sharpe had based his prices charged on those of a Halliday catalogue he had, while Foster also had a Halliday catalogue, an earlier one evidently, with prices slightly less. The bench ordered enquiry as to time catalogues were issued, as no month or year appeared on them, and gave judgment for the plaintiff for \$29.65 and costs, subject to any slight variation in cost of material if Sharpe's catalogue was not the latest at time goods were ordered.

Clara A. Rowe, Durham, was counsel for the plaintiff and Roy Grant, of Kilgour & Grant, Mount Forest, for the defendant.

FERGUS EDITOR PASSES

John C. Templin, for 35 years owner and editor of the Fergus News-Record, died at the home of his daughter, Dr. Marian Templin, in Hamilton Wednesday night. The late Mr. Templin, who was born in Fergus in 1870, a son of the late Mr and Mrs John Templin. He received his early education in Fergus public and high schools before attending Elora model school the first year he was in operation.

For 12 years the deceased taught on Fergus public school staff before buying the News-Record, served all most 30 years on Fergus Board of Education, was clerk of Melville United Church session for 33 years, and taught many years in the Sunday School. He was a Mason and a member of the I.O.O.F.. He is survived by one son, Hugh, editor of the Fergus News-Record, and two daughters, Dr. Marian and Miss Margaret Templin, both of Hamilton.

The older generation of publishers is fast passing away: all men of sterling character and integrity. In recent months Grey and Bruce's oldest publishers, W. H. Thurston of Fisherton and W. McDonald, Chesley, joined the Great Majority.

J. S. McIlraith Retiring from Business

Fergus School May Collapse.

The Fergus public school building in danger of collapsing and causing "a terrible disaster" is the report submitted by Inspector Menzies to the Board of Education. One of the rooms endangered is that taught by Oscar Moon, a Durham boy.
