Every Farm's A Laboratory

For Rural Economics - Problems In Taxation, Land Utilization, Consumer Preference All Come Into It.

Farmers have always been concerned with the economic aspects of their business, stated Dr. J. F. Booth, Associate Director of Marketing. Agricultural Economics, Dominion Department of Agriculture, in a recent address to the Saskatchewan and Alberta Dairy Associations. Everything that relates to price and income is referred to under the general heading of "economics."

Study Representative Farms Whereas a scientist in other fields has his laboratory or experimental plot for research and experimentation, the agricultural economist must work with data obtained from farms, business concerns, and other establishments. In dealing with profection problems, the farm is the economist's laboratory. His results are based upon the study of representative farms in selected areas of production. Many studies undertaken by the Economics Division, Dominion Department of Agriculture include hundreds of farms. In marketing research, those actually handling form products, privately owned and co-operative associations alike, are requested to provide information concerning their business activities. Problems in farm taxation, cura: credit, land utilization, and settlement, and consumer preference are all approached on the same basis.

Ontario crops generally wintered well, agricultural representatives throughout the province reported to the Department of Agriculture last week. Conditions in most maple-syrup centres pointed to short

> LESSON III PAUL ESTABLISHES CHURCHES

Printed Text, Acts 14:1-7, 19-23 Golden Text - "As a wise master biulder I laid a foundation; and another buildeth thereon." 1 Cor.

The Lesson In Its Setting Time - We cannot ascertain definitely how long Paul remained in each of these cities, but we are probably justified in placing the time for these events in A.D. 48 and 49.

Place - Principally in the cities of Iconium, Lystra and Derbe, in Asia Minor, and Antioch in Syria.

1. And it came to pass in Iconium that they entered together into the synagogue of the Jews. And so spake. The conversion of a very great multitude of Jews and Greeks at this time was due to the manner in which the apostle had spoken. That a great multitude both of Jews and of Greeks believ-

Difficulties in Iconium

2. But the Jews that were disobedient stirred up the souls of the Gentiles, and made them evil affected against the brethren. One would have thought Luke would say, "the Jews who did not believe." What he means by the word "disobedient" is that they disobeyed God in not receiving his

"BEWARE OF PITY" By Stefan Zweig

This, the first long novel by the famous author of "Marie Antoinette," is a psychological study. profoundly moving, of a beautiful crippled Austrian girl who falls in love with a young cavalry officer. The young man's pity causes him to form a close friendship with the girl which culminates in a crisis of great intensity.

Tragedy of the starkest kind brings this dramatic story to a close. The two young people become engaged but a misunderstanding drives the sensitive and impetuous girl to commit suicide, and there is an end both of pity and of love.

The lesson of Mr. Zweig's tale is that there are two kinds of pity -the selfless kind that heals and the selfish kind that wounds.


