MAKE IT EASY BY STREET CAR

New Street Car Information Men At Toronto Bus Terminal To Help Visitors

It sounds very simple to say that you can travel anywhere within the 34 square miles of Toronto for one street car fare.

It is simple if you know how, but many visitors to Toronto do not know how. Their actual experience has been that they pay a dollar or two more to take a taxi. In many instances the taxi fare in Toronto costs more than the visitor has paid to travel to Toronto.

To make it easy for all bus passengers in Toronto to use the local street car and bus system, a new "Street Car Information" desk has been placed in Toronto Bus Terminal. Courteous and competent men of Toronto Transportation Commission are on duty at this desk from 8.00 a.m. until midnight.

These men will give you a free Route Map and show you how to use it. In fact they will give individual attention in telling you exactly what car routes to use, where to transfer, if necessary, and what is the nearest stop to the street you are seeking.

Similar information will be given to those who want to go to an address in any of the municipalities which adjoin Toronto or whose street car or bus routes connect with the city routes.

As well as giving street car information, the new bureau will answer any enquiries for general information about Toronto and nearby municipalities,—about places, events, public buildings or any public service.

An interesting feature of the new "Street Car Information" service is that the men selected for this service are men of mature years, whom

women and children may feel free to approach with assurance that they will receive kind attention and dependable information or advice.

Next time you or your family visit Toronto, look for these men in the bus terminal at the sign "Street Car Information."
