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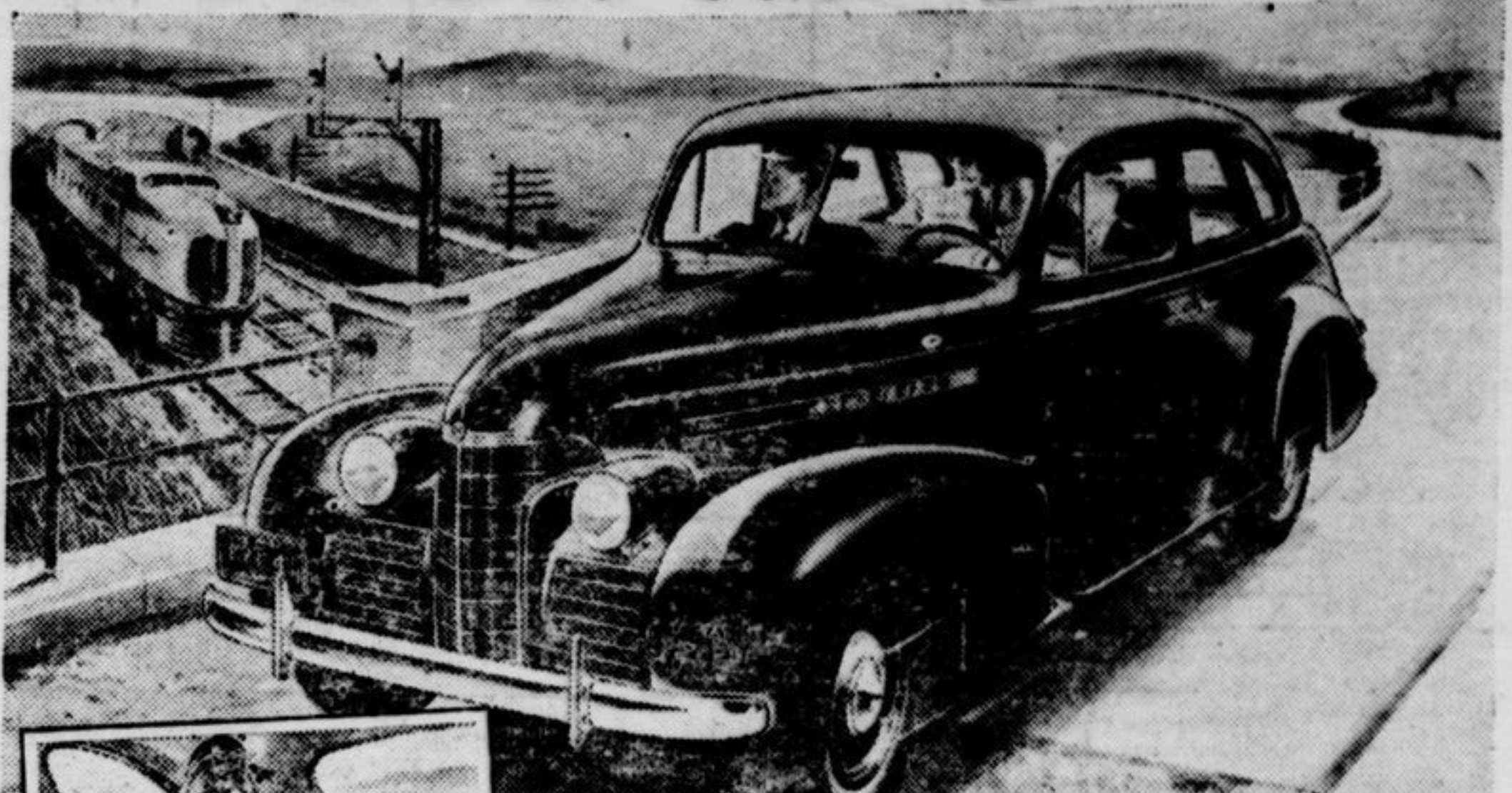

Whereat Mrs. Black shook her head sadly and said: "You do take yourself seriously." Mr. Woodworth pooh-poohed the idea of taking time off for such frivolity. But the question that haunts me is, what do I wear to the dinner?

MISS MAC PHAIL'S WEEKLY LETTER

No one could charge that Parliament has not been busy. Committees sit morning and afternoon, the Commons morning, afternoon and evening, and even the Senate does two sittings a day. And the subjects before Parliament have been important: the Mortgage Bank, wheat and more wheat, acreage bonus, national defence, as well as many odds and ends. But through it all there is a feeling of distraction; a sense of expectation. The King and Queen are coming! Ottawa is working day and night to make the Capital beautiful. Miraculously, full grown trees appear where none were. Street car lines are torn up, new pavements put down, unsightly buildings demolished or screened with evergreens, acres of new sod laid, public buildings richly decorated and the routes over which Their Majesties will travel made gay with bunting, flags and banners.

It is almost an impossibility to decorate buildings as immense and beautiful in themselves as the Parliament Buildings, but a valiant attempt has been made by hanging a reproduction of the Imperial Crown, seven-feet high, above the main entrance, and smaller copies of the King's Crown over the Commons entrance, and of the Queen's Crown over the Senate, the jewels being colored lights, and all three flanked by the flags of the Empire.

With our six invitations to formal functions, with prescribed attire, it is personal decorations that worry some of the M.P's. The other day a knot of Liberals who sit in the 'rump'—the overflow to the left of the Speaker—were chatting and laughing as I passed behind the curtain near them. When I enquired what the joke was, one of them said: "We have just been downtown to the milliner's buying Walter a silk hat to wear to the garden party." I said I would watch for him to see how he looked in it and they chorused: "That's why we are going."

A young Conservative M.P. rather shamedfacedly said to me: "I got my first Prince Albert. I hope my country never hears of it." And a C.C.F'er said he couldn't go to the dinner, although he had fought with the King's forces for four years, because he had not "tails" and didn't feel justified in buying them, with so much unemployment and misery to be alleviated. I suggested that he rent a suit, but he said he would never come to that. Another member of the C.C.F., who has been induced to order evening clothes for the dinner, says they
