Dictators Lead World Back To Era Of Savage

Eminent Psychiatrist Labels Mussolini And Hitler (Indirectly) as "Deviated Personalities"

Dictators were analyzed this week as "deviated personalities" who are leading the world back to the era of the "tom-tom beating savages."

Dr. Richard H. Hutchings of Utica, N. Y., psychiatrist of the New York State Department of Mental Hygiene and president of the American Psychiatric Association...

Without mentioning any dictator by name, Dr. Hutchings asserted "the evils which afflict the deviated personalities set in high places soon are found to have permeated the body politic and make evident the thin veneer which separates modern man from the tom-tom-beating savage of an earlier day."

Sister Ship Will Carry King Home

Empress of Britain Is Chartered For Their Majesties' Return Voyage to England

The King and Queen will return to England in the Canadian Pacific flag ship Empress of Britain at the conclusion of their North American tour.

The Empress of Britain, a 42,500-ton liner, launched in 1939 by the Duke of Windsor, has just come back from a world cruise.

The liner is in drydock for a general overhaul. Next she is scheduled to leave Southampton on her first regular sailing of the year for Quebec.

She will arrive there in plenty of time to do any refitting necessary to accommodate Their Majesties and their suite and to continue on to Halifax where she is due to pick up her royal passengers on the return trip.

While at Quebec City the Empress of Britain is likely to have her best accommodation refitted with furniture that is familiar and comfortable to His Majesty. This consists of many pieces which for years have been on the Royal Yacht, the Victoria and Albert.

Almanac Fears Weather Here

1823 Issue Warns Prospective Visitors to Canada to Beware the Treacherous Climate

A copy of the York Almanac and Royal Calendar of Upper Canada for 1823, in the possession of W. F. Nickle, former Attorney-General of Ontario...

The writer says the climate is "frightfully severe" and he considered it his duty to make that clear to incoming residents.

The 116-year-old paper says clergymen and doctors were needed in the new communities but there were already plenty of lawyers.

The paper estimated the population of Upper Canada was 200,000, its most important towns being Kingston and York.

Other towns becoming of note, it said, included Cornwall, Prescott, Brockville, Perth, Gananoque, Bath, Belleville, Halloway, Cobourg, Port Hope, Newmarket, Dundas, Ancaster, Barton, Grimsby, St. Catharines, Newark or Niagara, St. David's, Queenston, Chippewa, Watselec, Port Talbot, Amherstburg and Sandwich.

Amazement was expressed in one article that the soil was so productive, crops of 50 bushels of wheat an acre being known in the Newcastle District.

Acute Problem Of The Hog Industry

Producers of hogs in Canada are reminded that the increase in the number of over-finished and overweight hogs now being marketed is creating a very serious and acute problem in the export bacon and domestic pork trade.

Farmers are therefore strongly advised by the Dominion Department of Agriculture to refrain from over-fattening and endeavor to market their hogs before reaching a weight of 230 pounds at the farm.

Australia Aids Immigration With New Policy In Operation The Past Year 6,000 British Immigrants Were Admitted

Assisted passages to Australia of nearly 6,000 British immigrants were approved during the first 12 months of the federal government's new assisted migration policy.

A report covering the first year's operation of the new policy issued by Interior Minister McEwen shows 5,971 assisted passages to Australia for British migrants were approved and that a rapid increase in the flow of British migration has occurred in recent months.

The report says among the 88 skilled British industrial workers for specialized industries were 15 special artisans for paper pulp works in Tasmania, 34 skilled operatives for manufacture of condenser yarns and tire-cord yarns in Melbourne, and 13 skilled artisans for steel-tube manufacture in Adelaide.

A Two-Hour Nap May Add Half-An-Inch To His Height

A two-hour nap may add as much as half an inch to a child's stature. This phenomenon, demonstrating the semi-elasticity of the human body, is reported to the National Research Council by Drs. Janet M. Redfield and Howard V. Meredith, of the State University of Iowa.
