Conway Picked to Win Over O'Sullivan on Friday

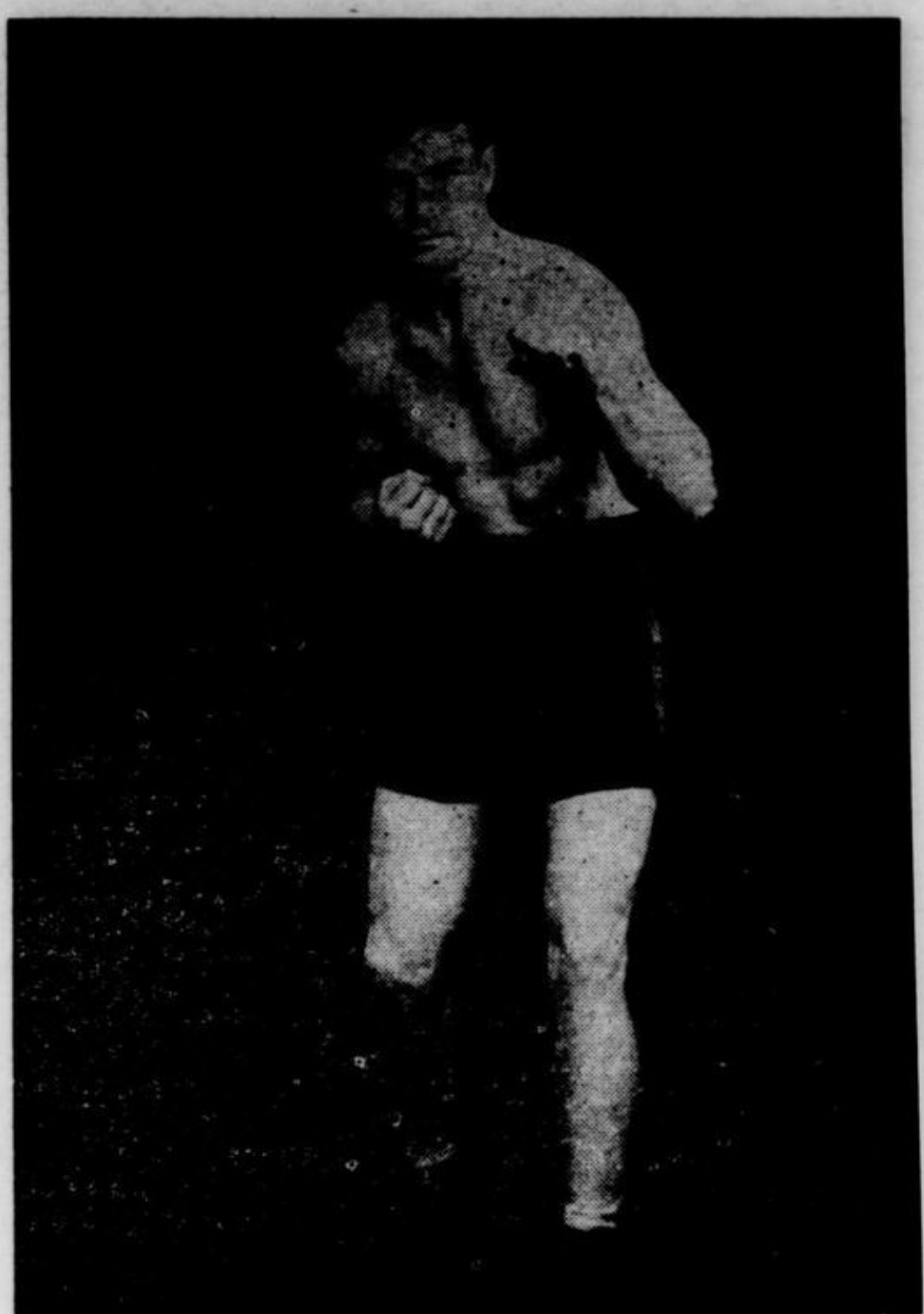
Friday, May 26th, all roads will lead to the Durham Arena, where (Red) Conway and Jack O'Sullivan will exchange blows. Conway is favored to win, as he has fought the best in the world. Against champion Joe Louis in Toronto, Conway was knocked down three times the first and second rounds and it looked like curtains for the fiery redhead; but he got up to go the distance, and in the last round, he surprised everyone, including his handlers, by taking the fight to Louis and making him back up. Conway has also fought Bob Pastor, losing a hairline decision in New York city.

About a month ago, while Jack O'Sullivan was going through his training grid in Singer's Buffalo gym, one of the world's greatest boxers casually strolled into the box, watched Jacko box a couple of rounds, and immediately enquired for Jacko's board of strategy. It was no other than Mickey Walker, former welterweight, middleweight and light-heavy weight champion of the world. He offered Hec. Oliver a cool \$2000 for a half interest in Jacko, saying "you have something there" but Oliver just shook his head and laughingly replied: "Mickey, I do not believe there is that much money in the world, but anyway, how about a picture of you and Jacko together?" to which Mickey obligingly consented and also spent some time giving Jack a few pointers on how to box an elusive canteen boxer. O'Sullivan has had 22 pro. fights and has lost one. He has everything to gain in beating Conway. Jack has beaten some good boys who were considered tops: George Burke, 1937 Dominion champion and Danny Paul, in 3 rounds. Jack will have about 8 lbs. on Conway, which will tell over the long route. Jack is 21, Conway is 26. Will size and experience triumph over youth?
