At Banff Their Majesties will enjoy their only real holiday of the trip and the cooking of Chief Chef Philippe Vignal, formerly of Paris, London, New York, Montreal, Italy and China, assisted by Chef Ferry. Their Majesties will be at Banff for dinner May 26, three meals May 27, and breakfast May 28.

The Empress Hotel at Victoria, B.C., farthest west of the Canadian Pacific trans-Canada chain, will be the scene of a state dinner in honor of Their Majesties, May 30, for which Chief Chef Caspar Anderg will display all the cooking artistry he gained in his native Switzerland and England before joining the Canadian Pacific in 1912.
