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Guelph Drew Immense Crowds for Royal Visit

Hundreds from Durham, and South Grey were among the fifty thousand who packed Guelph streets and lined the railway tracks Tuesday to see our King and Queen. There were five special trains from the North alone, each carrying 1,000 or more, while hundreds also went by motor car. On the Durham special 589 entrained here, the greatest crowd ever to have here by train. These included about 200 adults, and 600 children from Durham High and Public Schools, Williamsford school (Camp McLean, teacher), No. 3, Bentinck (H. Milligan, teacher) and a few from other schools. It was a glorious outing for the kiddies, perhaps half of whom were having their first train ride. Some 20 (joined in at Varney, about 50 from Holstein, and 400 at Mt. Forest.

Arriving about 11.40 at Guelph Junction, truckloads of school children from Hillsburg, Erin and other points were seen coming in. Durham children, the Band in natty new uniforms and most of the adults took their position in the Durham space beside the tracks. Here over a three hour wait ensued when first the pilot train and finally the Royal train 40 min. late, came in. Their Majesties appeared on rear platform and chatted to those closed by when train stopped for servicing, so some of the crowd of 20,000 here lining tracks for a mile or two, had a good view of them for five minutes. Unfortunately, Durham's space was half way along beside the train, and not until the train was passing after starting again, did we see the King and Queen. The train was then travelling 15 to 20 miles per hour, and while they were clearly seen waving to all a few feet in front, it was only a passing glimpse. Others from town were at Guelph station, while a few from town and district went to Kitchener, London or Hamilton.

The special returned to Durham about 6.40, but most motorists were home a couple of hours sooner.

Mighty Case Dismissed

Hon. Mr Justice C. P. McTague at the non-jury sitting of the Supreme Court for Grey County, on Wednesday dismissed the action brought by Charles Mighton against George Mighton, both parties being residents of Bentinck township which occupied two full days. The action was one involving the payment of certain monies by one party to the other, the claim being that the money was paid back. There was a great conflict of evidence by the large number of witnesses called, but at the conclusion of the trial His Lordship dismissed the action, which had been before the court for more than a year. C. R. McKeown, K. C. Toronto was counsel for the plaintiff, and Campbell Grant, Walkerton, was the defendant's counsel.

Mrs. Neil McKechnie Died Suddenly Tuesday

Out in her garden ten minutes previously, Mrs. Neil McKechnie of town had come into her home on Tuesday morning, and was carrying a jug of cream down cellar, when she suffered a hemorrhage of the brain and fell down the cellar steps. Her sister, Mrs. H. Williams, who was at her home at the time, and her niece, Mrs. J. Rutherford, heard the fall, and rushing to her aid, found her suffering and brought her up. Medical aid was promptly on hand, but of no avail, and she expired ten minutes after. She had been in fair health all along, and had attended service in Knox Church as usual two days previously.

The deceased was formerly Margaret Brown Jack, eldest daughter of the late Richard and Agnes Jack of Timpendean, Scotland, where she was born 82 years ago last February. In 1861 the family came to the States, settling near Ogdensburg, New York, for two years, thence moved to the Jack homestead in Glenelg township. In 1889 she was married to Neil McKechnie, who predeceased her 35 years ago. Since her marriage Mrs. McKechnie has lived continuously in Durham, where she has been a true neighbor and friend to many, and an active member of Knox United Church. She has also been a prominent worker in the W.M. Society of the church. Surviving are one sister Agnes, Mrs. H. Williams of Glenelg, and two brothers, William Jack of Glenelg, and Sam of Winnipeg. A brother Thos. died ten years ago, and two sisters, Mrs. Rutherford and Mrs. Cushnie, five and three years ago. The funeral service takes place at the home at 2.30 p.m. Thursday, interment being made in Durham cemetery.

W. E. Harris, Markdale is Liberal Candidate

Grey-Bruce Liberals today, Thursday, chose W. E. Harris, barrister of Markdale, at their nominating convention to oppose Agnes C. Macphail M.P., at the coming Federal election. He received a clear majority on the first ballot over John Durrell, Aytca J. A. Paterson, Hanover, and J. H. McQuarrie, Durham. The hall was crowded with delegates.

Expect Favorable Fire Inspector's Report

At Durham Council Monday, Coun. McGowan thought a very favourable report would be forthcoming from the Fire Inspector. He had tested hydrants here and there, and seemed well pleased with the fire hall equipment, time and tests made.

General accounts of \$817.35 and Relief for May of \$102.69 were passed.

As Consolidated Sand & Gravel Co. are abandoning and removing their Durham plant, Council as a Court of Revision reluctantly cut assessment over half, down to \$1650 on and \$5,000 on buildings, a total of \$6650. Their representative offered to deed the land free back to the town.

Durham Ag. Society were given \$25 grant instead of \$15, and 1 free night hall rent. The Red Cross Society were given two nights in hall free.

Council endorsed resolution of London City Council re registration of transients. Reeve Hunter criticized the habit of bicycle riding without lights at night. Bylaw may be amended to enforce this.
