A FACT A WEEK ABOUT CANADA

TOBACCO GROWING PROGRESS

The history of tobacco growing in Canada reaches back into the early colonial days. The French settlers on banks of the St Lawrence found the custom of tobacco smoking to be general among the natives. For some years very few of the whites acquired the habit, partly because of governmental opposition. Eventually, however, smoking became general and farmers began to grow the plant; but it was not until about 1735 that the home government actually encouraged tobacco growing in Canada.

Tobacco growing under British rule and production gradually reached its peak in 1938 with a crop of approximately 96,000,000 pounds. The tobacco grown in Canada consists mainly of the types and varieties cultivated in the United States. An exception to this is found in the pipe tobaccos produced in the province of Quebec. These comprise a somewhat mixed group of varieties, the origin of some reaching back into the days of the French regime in Canada, while the seed of others was brought from Europe more recently.

REFORESTATION IS PROCEEDING IN GLENELG

A large number of men are engaged at present in planting of many thousand treelets on the tract of land, comprising 500 acres, in the northern part of Glenelg, in carrying out of the agreement entered into some time ago between the Ontario government and the County of Grey. The tract of land in the southern section of the township has already been taken care of with respect to the reforestation scheme, and excellent results have been obtained. This year it was decided to go ahead with the other 500 acre tract and Herbert Atkinson, superintendent, is in charge of the work. Twenty Markdale men are being given employment on this work and are being driven back and forth from their work every day in the school bus. The weather has been suitable for the work, and growing conditions are considered excellent. With two tracts of 500 acres each operating under the reforestation scheme it will not be many years before results will be apparent.

WATER SUPPLY, PLUMBING AND SEWAGE DISPL. AT FARM HOMES There is probably no equipment on the farm that raises the standard of living there, so much as a water system and bathroom. "Now that I have running water in the house, both hot and cold, thanks to our Hydro electrical heater, I wouldn't give you 'thank you' for living in the city," said one farm woman of our acquaintance recently. "Instantaneous hot water makes my job of washing milk pails and utensils, no job at all."

These farmers who are interested in farm water supplies, and plumbing and sewage disposal for the farm home, should procure two recent bulletins on these subjects for the Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto. They were both written by Prof. R. R. Graham, B. A., B. S. A., Department of Agricultural Engineering, O. A. C. Guelph. These bulletins are supplied free of charge. Prof. Graham discusses aids to finding underground water supplies, types of wells, farm cisterns and wells, water systems, installation and care and other features. The bulletins are profusely illustrated. The plumbing bulletin contains 31 pages and gives valuable and money-saving information on plumbing and sewage disposal for the farm home.
