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Little Road Work to be Done in 1939

At Grey County Council in Owen Sound last week, S. M. Patterson, reeve of Egremont and chairman of the County roads committee, tendered the report of that body which told of the work that had been done by it since the last meeting.

The report also referred to the letter from the chief inspector of gasoline tax, which stated that the tax on fuel oil had been increased from 6 to 8 cents per gallon from March 31st.

After the council had gone into committee of the whole on the report with Reeve William McGregor in the chair, considerable discussion followed on several clauses of the report.

In view of the fact that the committee was doing its utmost to keep well within the appropriation, they requested that the members of the Council refrain from asking for extra expenditures in their respective municipalities.

MRS. ALEX. McLACHLAN The death of Mrs. Alexander McLachlan, a native of Durham and a life-long resident, took place in Durham hospital Wednesday afternoon, after a brief illness with an inward trouble.

The deceased was Catherine Paterson, daughter of the late Mr and Mrs Peter Paterson, who was born in Durham seventy-two years ago, and has ever since resided here.

She was a woman who possessed a very sympathetic disposition, was ever a true neighbor and friend, and was devoted to her family.

After an illness of nearly a year, the last three months of which were spent in Durham hospital, John Francis Wright died there on Saturday afternoon in his 72nd year.

When he was born on the North Sea, when his parents, James and Mary Wright, were en route to Glasgow, Scotland. After his father's death he came to Canada at the age of seven with an elder brother, and was placed in a church home for a time.

A private funeral service was held on Monday afternoon from his late residence, conducted by Rev. M. H. Farr, assisted by his father, Rev. T. Farr. Interment was made in Trinity church cemetery, the pallbearers being Chas. Kennedy, Thos. Whitmore, Duncan Smellie, Chas. Moffat, John Dohney, Reg. Simmons.
