On Cooking Vegetables

At some time in our lives, we all, no doubt, have been guilty of unfairness to members of the vegetable kingdom. They, who offer us flavor, minerals and vitamins and are regular storehouses of health and energy, we often unthinkingly er maybe unknowingly cast aside. If properly cooked they're so benefielal, but improper cooking renders them only useful as bulk.

1. Do always use rapidly boilingly water, when boiling or steaming except when cooking dried vegetables, which should be soaked evernight and put on in cold wat-

2. Do not add salt and pepper at first, but when vegetable is about half done.

3. Do cook strong-flavored vegetables e.g. turnips, cabbage, Brussels sprouts and cauliflower in large amounts of water.

4. Cook mild vegetables e.g. peas. carrots, etc. in small amount of water and save this liquid for soups, sauces etc.

5. Do not overcook vegetables. It is better to have them a little crisp than overdone.

6. Do steam all vegetables possible, for this method retains more feed value than boiling. Baking ranks second in value for cooking. 7. Vegetables which can be cook ed in their own juices: -- tomatoes. equash, spinach and vegetable mar-

Summer days should be good days for the serving of fish. Too often is this choice food listed for Fridays and Lenten dishes only. In warm weather as the family loses their appetite for your ordinary meat course, try your tactics on

A FISH CHAT

fish dishes. This of course is the

best season for fresh fish. Fresh fish is divided into two classifications "white" and "oily". In white fish the oil is in the liver, but in salmon it is all in the body.

The flesh of good fish should be firm and elastic, eyes bright, full, round and bulging. The tail should not be drooping and the gills should be red and full of blood.

A Simple Dressing

Baked fish or steamed is much better for the digestion than the fried, and serving this way calls for a dressing. Here is a simple dressing:

1 cup cracker or bread crumbs 1 tablespoon salt

1 teaspoon chopped onion 1 teaspoon chopped parsley

1/8 teaspoon pepper 2 tablespoons butter

Clean, wipe and dry fish. Rub with salt. Fill cavity with stuffing, then sew cavity, rub all over with butter and salt and pepper, and a little flour. Place in hot oven to bake. If steaming, prepare in the same manner.

For those who find it difficult to obtain fresh fish, do not think unkindly of canned fish. Canned goods to-day are under very rigid supervision and are thus prepared in a very scientific manner. Insist upon a good brand-it does not pay to buy cheap ones, and in so doing you will be protected. Any pantry lacking these valuable canned goods in summer is only running on three cylinders. We have two special favorites, salmon and tuna. There are two valuable points to remember about canned salmon. Firstly the liquid in the tin should be retained, for it is rich in jodine. Secondly, while we discard the bones of home cooked salmon the canned should be kept and crushed. These bones contain valuable minerals. Tuna, the "chicken of the sea" is the fish we should automatically turn to as an alternative to the faithful bird from the poultry farm. There are few things we do with chicken serving either hot or cold, which are not equally good when made with tuna.

Baked Salmon Loaf

--0--

Put one cup milk into a double boiler and add enough bread crumbs to make a smooth paste. Cook until thick, stirring constant ly, add a can of salmon chopped cup of cream, salt and pepper to season, 3 eggs beaten separately, folding in the stiffly beaten whites last. Mix thoroughly, pour into a buttered mold. Set into a pan of hot water and bake until firm in a moderate oven.

Jellied Tuna

9% oz. tin of cream of spinach soup 1/2 cup thick boiled salad dressing 1 package (pint) plain gelatine

1/4 cup boiling water 1 cup flaked tuna fish

1/4 teaspoon salt 1/8 teaspoon pepper

2 tablespoons chopped pimento Heat the soup. Soak gelatine in two tablespoons cold water. Add boiling water, stir thoroughly, add to soup. Now fold in the flaked fish mixing well, then the salad dressing, and lastly pimento, salt and pepper. Place in mold and chill.

This makes a very lovely platter dish, unmould on lettuce (crisp) and surround with the cottage cheese ball salad I told you about a few weeks ago. Decorate platter with salad dressing and top with current jelly (red).

Wear Your Skirt At Right Length


Hemlines Now Are Between 14 and 18 Inches From the Floor
