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## Grey-Bruce Tories Choose C. Knechtel, Hanover, as Candidate

The Conservative nominating convention in Hanover town hall last Friday night, chose Carl Knechtel of Hanover, manager of the Knechtel Furniture Company and one of Grey County's most outstanding business men, to be the party candidate in Grey-Bruce riding at the next Federal election. Only three Hanover men allowed their names to go to the ballot: C. Knechtel, Reeve Austin Ball and ex-reeve Robert Brigham. Brigham was eliminated on the first ballot and Knechtel won out over Ball on the second.

Evidence of the intense interest that is manifest through the district was to be found in the large crowd who packed the Town Hall for the event, and in the willingness with which three of those nominated allowed their names to stand. Those named were Messrs. Joseph Bryans of Sullivan Township; Henry T. Brunt of Hanover; Robert Brigham of Hanover; Austin Ball, Hanover; W. G. McBride of Priceville; Rev. M. H. H. Farr of Durham, and Carl Knechtel of Hanover. McBride, Brunt and Farr immediately declared that they had no intention of standing, and Joseph Bryans, first agreeing to stand, later decided that he would not enter the competition. This left the voting between three Hanover men.

President of the Grey-Bruce Conservative Association, Dr. D. B. Jamieson was in the chair as Friday evening's activities got under way, and after a few words of introduction, he called upon Mayor A. J. Metzger, mayor of the town, to extend a welcome to those who were present.

Nominations were proceeded with at once, and the election of a candidate occupied the entire earlier part of the evening. As it was growing quite late, and the guest speaker of the evening had had no chance to speak, it suggested that the actual election of officers for the Association itself be postponed. However, this was deemed inadvisable, and after some discussion, the following slate of officers was named to control the activities of the Association during the coming year: President, Austin Ball, reeve of Hanover; 1st Vice-President, Rev. M. H. H. Farr of Durham; 2nd Vice-President, E. B. Caldwell of Chesley; Secretary, William Brunt, Hanover, and Treasurer, F. D. Sawyer of Markdale. Messrs. Frank Irwin and A. Bell of Durham were named auditors.

The new candidate, Mr. Knechtel, is making his first venture into the field of politics. Following the announcement of his success, each of those who had named him withdrew their names, making the election a unanimous one.

Mr. Knechtel declared that he was anything but a "died-in-the-wool Conservative"; rather, he stated that the one object of any candidate should be the good of the entire riding—not only those who had supported him. It was with a view of this kind that he was entering politics for the first time, and he pledged that he would do everything in his power to see that an effort was made to improve the lot of those for whom he was representative. ## Prosecution To Follow Failure to Dim Headlights

All Provincial Highway Traffic Officers throughout Ontario received instructions last week, that legislation has finally been put into effect, calling for the prosecution of drivers who fail to dim their headlights while meeting other vehicles on the highway at night. This law has long been a needed one, for although all modern automobiles are equipped with headlamp dimmers, there are still those motorists who scorn the precautionary and courteous measure of using them.

Glaring headlights have been the cause of countless accidents during the past years, and up until now, there has been no law forcing drivers to turn down their lights when meeting other traffic.

In brief, the new section states that motorists failing to dim their headlights when they come within 500 feet of an approaching vehicle will be prosecuted, and it is the sincere intention of the government to see that it is put into immediate effect.

## A'l Grey Co. Cattle Herds to be Inspected

The Department of Agriculture at Ottawa are sending a number of inspectors into Grey County immediately to start the work of making Grey a restricted area with regard to cattle, which means that all cattle in the county must hereafter be free from tubercular infection. It is expected that the work will begin in Normandy township, in the southern part of the county, and also in Collingwood township, in the northern part of the county.

About 15 men will be employed at the start in making the inspection, as there are many herds in the county to be inspected, and it is estimated that it will take at least six months to complete the inspection of about 125,000 cattle in the county. All cattle which are rejected by the inspectors and ordered destroyed will be paid for by the Department of Agriculture at a rate to be fixed by the entrance fees; Mrs D. M.
