Leonard McComb Fatally Injured when Pole Splinter Pierced Brain

A shocking accident befel Leonard Archibald McComb, hydro line man of Durham, when he was pierced in the eye by a splinter from a broken hydro pole, early Sunday morning in Mount Forest, dying in hospital eleven hours afterwards.

The storm Saturday night had broken down four hydro poles there and Leonard was one of an emergency squad sent to repair the line and restore power, which was thus cut off. With a fellow worker, he was trying to remove a broken pole. When he released a hand connecting pole to its support, the top section, freed at base and held by wires, swung back and a splinter 1 1/2 inches thick pierced his right eye, and penetrated three inches into the brain. It was removed and he was rushed to Mt. Forest hospital, where the wood was extracted, but no hopes were entertained for his recovery.

Leonard was a popular young man in his 31st year. He was born in Durham, the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Grant McComb. He was married five years ago to Blanche Muzdeck daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Murdock, who survives with two children: Terry, aged three years and Mary Lou, aged two and a half mos. Besides the sorely bereaved wife and parents, a sister and two brothers also mourn: Mrs. Cuthbertson (Esther) of Toronto; Lewis of Wilbury, and Gordon at home.

The deceased after school days was employed as a Bell Telephone line man, but for the last ten years, he has been with the Hydro Com. After marriage, they were a few months in Durham, then four years at Eugenia returning to live in Durham last spring.

The funeral service at the parental home on Wednesday was very largely attended. Rev. S. W. Hirtle was in charge, assisted by Rev. Mr. Hill of Dundee, Illinois, and Rev. Mr. Moore of Shakespeare. Interment took place in Durham cemetery, the pall bearers being Bowman Jamieson, Wm. Wilson, Robt. Saunders, Mel. Belfry, Jas. Noble, Floyd Pratt, John-stoff Allen, Camp, McLean.

Rev. John Bell Took Knox Services Sunday

Before large congregations, Rev. John E. Bell, pastor of Gower Street United Church, St. Johns, Newfoundland, preached two inspiring sermons in his home church, Knox United on Sunday. A former Durham chorister, William Benson of Niagara Falls, sang a solo at morning service and the male quartette sang at both services. Next Sunday Rev. E. Baker of Meaford will occupy Knox pulpit.

The Review was pleased to have a call from Rev. John, and to learn of his work in Britain's oldest colony. He has a congregation of 600 families and 2000 members and adherents, the largest on the island, which means heavy work. The Newfoundlanders, he says, are a hospitable, friendly people, mostly engaged in fishing and mining, though agricultural pursuits are gradually gaining. It is a land of rivers, lakes and hills, of wonderful scenic beauty, and more moderate in climate than Ontario, owing to proximity of the Gulf Stream. With proper advertising of its attractions, he believes the tourist trade could and should be greatly increased. With Mrs. Bell and family, at present visiting her parents in Owen Sound, he will return next Saturday.
