#### Handy Household Hints

To coat food to be fried a golden brown with egg and crumbs is very easy to do, and well worth the effort.

Break an egg into a shallow dish, beat slightly with a fork until the white and yolk are mixed; stir in 2 tablespoons of water. In a second shallow dish put finely rolled dry bread crumbs. Dip the food into the egg mixture, turn until all sides are coated, lift with a fork and hold over the dish until the excess egg has drained off. Dip the egg-coated food into the crumbs and turn until it is evenly covered, then fry.

Savoy cabbages with crinky leaves are the finest quality home garden cabbages.

To cut balls of melon for cocktails and salads with a French cutter, place the cutting edge of the ball cutter against the peeled surface of the fruit or vegetable. With even pressure on the knife, roll from right to left and left to right alternately, so that the knife cuts into the food first on one side and then on the other.

Continue until the food shows through the hole in the back of the cutter. Still exerting pressure on the knife, lift the handle until it is at right angles with the food. Turn the handle completely around in the hand and lift out the ball.

To obtain the professional looking glaze on linen, it is necessary to use cold starch, and iron while articles are still damp. Now dip a piece of flannel in some French chalk, and rub this smoothly on each article, after which a piece of white curd soap is rubbed over the chalk. Lastly the articles are ironed on the wrong side only with a moderately hot iron; when done they have the appearance of new articles.

Fire guards which have been used throughout the winter can be made into pretty screens to hide often unsightly empty fireplaces. Embroider a piece of linen crash, er use up a remnant of curtain material, and tack it to the front of the guard. This can be easily removed for washing, and can be stored when you want to use the guard for the fire again.

To avoid unpleasant cooking odors, strong-flavored vegetables are best cooked tied in parchment cooking paper.

By the way, what do you do with your old table napkins? We discovered a friend of ours throwing hers away the other day and told her she was foolish. If you sew a loop of tape or a curtain ring to one corner and hang it by the sink, you have a new and excellent glass cloth!

To make fine white breadcrumbs onickly it is a good idea to put the soft part of a stale loaf into a clean muslin bag, tie it firmly at the top, and gently rub it for a few minutes between the hads. when the crumbs will be fine enough for any purpose.

Save the water in which you boil the onions for dinner and use it for cleaning the gilt frames of your pictures or mirrors, while for the mirrors themselves, and the windows too, methylated spirit can be used with safety.

Lamb "Lucitania" Sent to Regent's Park Zoo


