"Every member should be included in the year's program," said Miss Clarke, outlining the services available through the Department, particularly the Home Economic studies, which may add immeasurably to the convenience, health and beauty of rural living. "Do not be afraid to try something new," was Miss Clarke's excellent closing note.

The Women's Institute Ode, written by an unknown author and adopted by the organization 27 years ago, was the subject of an interesting talk by Mrs J. A. Martin of Proton Station. "The Ode awakens the friendly spirit in opening the meeting," said Mrs Martin.

Mrs John Anderson of Strathovan was North Grey's representative on the program and took as her subject, "Mutual Relations Between Home and School." These two are the main pillars of the nation, said Mrs Anderson, dwelling upon the importance of high ideals in home and school and the responsibility of the parents in beginning the child's training and later co-operating with the teacher.

Arthur Haas spoke briefly on the subject of "Health Insurance." Two percent of the people of Canada are constantly ill. Mr. Haas stated, with an annual cost of sickness of three million dollars. Mr. Haas urged the branches to study the various health insurance plans guaranteeing medical care and hospitalization to rural people in times of illness.

Music and other entertainment features interspersed the program. Mrs Wilfred Renwick conducted assembly singing with Mrs Russel Drimble of Dromore at the piano. Mrs C. Fenton of Holstein sang a sweet solo. Mrs Wallace Adams of Holstein gave a humorous reading. Miss Middleton and Bourne of Durham gave an instrumental duet. The invitation of the Owen Sound Branch to hold the County rally in Owen Sound next year was accepted.

A FACT A WEEK ABOUT CANADA

WEEPING WILLOW "I'll hang my harp on a weeping willow tree," said to be a line from a poem written by an English gentleman who was hopelessly in love with Queen Victoria, has given

a touch of sadness to the willow. So also has the willow of Babylon, enshrined in our memory by the passage in the 137th Psalm, where the captive Children of Israel are represented as hanging their harps upon the willows by the rivers of Babylon. Of course, the English poem referred to should not be confused with the tavern song in parody.

The weeping willow came to the North American continent from the East through the agency of Alexander Pope, the English poet. The story goes that Pope was present when the cover was taken off a box of fruit shipped to England from Smyrna. He observed that one of sticks appeared as if it contained some life. He planted it in the hope that it would grow into something not known in England. From that stick grew the willow tree that has given birth to so many others.

During the American Revolution, a young British officer brought a slip of Pope's tree with him across the Atlantic, and from it, it is said, have come all the Weeping Willows in North America. Linnaeus, the great botanist, named the tree salix Babylonica, the allusion being obvious.

The willow tree is a beautiful tree. The flowers appear before the leaves and with the fruits resemble those of the poplars. They may be readily recognized from other trees by their winter buds, which are covered by single scales. On some of our waterways they make a lovely picture as, for example, on the banks of the Otanabee River between Peterborough and Rice Lake in Ontario.

The wood is light, soft, tough for its weight, and perishable when exposed to conditions favouring decay. It is used for artificial limbs, for cricket bats, and mainly for special purposes, but it is not of commercial importance.

The death of an overseas Lieut. Charles Steer took suddenly last Saturday morning Toronto. The previous Monday was rushed to East General hospital where he operated upon for pneumonia. The operation was successful, but on Tuesday complications set in and he lived only days after.

Deceased was born April 18, at Rotherham, England, and out to Canada to Leader, Sask. 1922 he was married to Ada, second daughter of Mr and Mrs Ian Boyd of Glenora, Ont. To be born two daughters, a son: Jeanette, aged 15, Shirley and Allan 5. In 1927 they came to Lloydminster, Sask. to Toronto where they have since lived, Steer being employed as a mechanic with Manco Road Motors and highly esteemed by all.

He was a first Lieut. in the permanent militia. He enlisted 1916 served overseas and was crably discharged in 1919.

The remains were sent to Durham and interment took place in cemetery Monday afternoon.
