## Plan to Attend Durham Fall Fair, Friday September 8th

### THE ROLL CALL

#### LIEUT. CHAS. STEER

The death of an overseas veteran Lieut. Charles Steer took place suddenly last Saturday morning in Toronto. The previous Monday he was rushed to East General hospital, where he was operated upon for appendicitis. The operation was successful, but on Tuesday complications set in and he lived only four days after.

Deceased was born April 18, 1899 at Rotherham, England, and came out to Canada to Leader, Sask. In 1922 he was married to Ada Boyd, second daughter of Mr and Mrs Allan Boyd of Glenora. To them were born two daughters, and a son: Jeanette, aged 15, Shirley 12, and Allan 5. In 1937 they came from Lloydminster, Sask. to Toronto, where they have since lived, Mr Steer being employed as head mechanic with Manor Road Motors, and highly esteemed by all.

He was a first Lieut. in the non-permanent militia. He enlisted in 1916, served overseas and was honorably discharged in 1919.

The remains were sent to Durham, and interment took place in Zion cemetery Monday afternoon. The funeral service in Zion Church was conducted by Rev. W. H. Smith, assisted by Rev. S. W. Hirtle. Mrs Thos Glenoson and Mrs James Peart sweetly sang a duet, "Breathe on Me Breath of God." Afterwards a military funeral was given, Comrade G. R. Padfield sounding the Last Post, while Sergt. Geo. Catchpole and a firing squad of 12 from Owen Sound were present.

The pallbearers were veterans Hector MacDonald, D. M. Saunders, Herbert Atkinson, E. J. Schenk, Arthur McGowan, Vernon Elvidge; also the flower bearers: Joseph Young, Alex. Hay, Harold McKechnie, Al. Saunders, Will McGowan.

#### MRS. COUTTS-BAIN

Madame Catherine Couitts-Bain well known throughout Canada and the United States as a Scottish vocalist, died in Toronto Saturday. She was born in Durham, being an aunt of Mr Benjamin Couitts of Vickers, but has lived in Toronto practically all her life. She has frequently appeared on the concert platform in Durham, mainly in the days of thirty years ago when the Sons of Scotland concerts featured her and Jimmy Fax. She possessed an excellent soprano voice.

### Fine of \$40 and Costs Injured in Collision Imposed on Lake near Varney Store

Pleading guilty to a charge of reckless driving Wilfred Lake of Toronto, was fined \$40 and costs amounting to \$65.50 in all, and his driver's license cancelled for six months in police court here on Friday before Magistrate Spereman. The charge arose out of an accident on Saturday, July 1st, when Lake's car collided with a truck and trailer driven by W. Williams of Preston, at top of Orchard hill. Both cars were badly damaged, and the occupants suffered more or less severe injuries, though all are now out of the hospital. Prov. Officer Hunter and the defendant, W. Lake, gave the only evidence heard, Hunter testifying to the position of the cars and the marks on pavement when he arrived on the scene about a hour after. Lake stated he was travelling about 45 miles per hour, but couldn't tell just how he had swerved into path of the other car. As he admitted causing the accident, no other witnesses were called.

Thos. Elliott was charged by Prov. Officer France of Walkerton with driving a motor vehicle without due care or attention on No. 4 Highway near Vickers on July 22 when his '28 Chev. sedan ran off the edge of the highway and turned upside down in ditch. Elliott was little hurt and stated he was lighting a cigarette at the time. A fine of \$15 and costs was imposed.

Harold Roseborough had M. Nicholls up on a charge of theft of a load of posts. Nicholls had secured permission from Clarence Adlam who was working with Roseborough, to take them, it seems, but Roseborough hadn't yet received payment for them. The magistrate dismissed the charge, stating it was in the wrong court, and should be sued in Division Court.

### Two years for Defauding Egremont Resident

Paul R. Guse of Kitchener was sentenced to two years in Kingston penitentiary by Magistrate E. C. Spereman at Owen Sound Tuesday, on three charges of fraud. Guse was given two years on each of two charges, of obtaining \$319.27 from Margaret Leith of Egremont township, and of converting \$638.50 of David Zettler's money to his own use. He also received three months on a charge of conversion where he obtained \$21 from Zettler. All sentences will run concurrently on these convictions and on sentences imposed elsewhere in the province.

A case told of being held responsible 10 years ago in connection with loans totalling \$13,000 at a bank where he had been employed. He borrowed \$13,000 to cover his bank difficulties and since that time, he related, he has been borrowing and using money paid him to cover his debts. He was using the money paid him by one person to cover the purchases of another, he declared, his sole aim being to pay off the debts and not to defraud anyone. "I have paid off \$6,000 already."

Monday, October 9th, has been officially proclaimed as Thanksgiving Day by the Dominion government.

Mr. W. S. Harris, publisher of the Vernon B.C. News, and a former Durham boy and Review graduate, has been elected president of the Rotary Club in that town.

The McDonald Tobacco Co. have presented and are installing a new time clock in Chesley rink. It is 4 feet 4 in. square, electrically run and lit with two 500 watt lamps. To the right of the clock is the scoreboard. The clock and a large new sign erected are valued at \$425.

Installing New Water Wheel: The old water wheel at McGowan's mill being damaged, McGowan Bros. are replacing it with a large new one, made in Meaford, and costing several hundred dollars. Whereas the former wheel developed 35 horse power, the new one will develop 75, over twice the former power.
