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Rev. Dr. Stewart at Baptist Anniversary

The Baptist Anniversary Services were a pronounced success. The weather man had marked the day, Sept. 17th 1939 as especially bright and cool after an extremely hot Saturday. Large and interested audiences listened with pleasure and profit to the very heartening, helpful, and hopeful messages of the guest preacher, Rev. Dr. H. S. Stewart, Lean of Theology of McMaster University.

In the evening the preacher discoursed on "Being Renewed Day by Day," choosing as his text 2 Corinthians 4:16 "Wherefore we faint not; but though our outward man is decaying, yet our inward man is renewed day by day." (R.V.) He began by quoting a sonnet on an August hot day, as follows:—

"Twas August, and the fierce sun overhead
Smote on the squalid streets of Bethnal Green,
And the pale weaver, through his windows seen
In Spitalfields, looked three dispirited.

I met a Preacher there I knew, and said,
"Thou'st o'erworked, how fare you in this scene?"

"Bravely!" said he, "for I of late have been
Much cheered by thoughts of Christ, the living Bread."

O human soul! as long as thou canst so
Set up a marl of everlasting light,
Above the howling sense's ebb and flow,
To cheer thee, and to right thee if thou roam—
Not with lest toil thou labourst through the night!
Thou'st makest the heaven thou hopest indeed thy home."

Dr. Stewart said that Christianity has not yet achieved. The Kingdom of Heaven has not yet come. But true greatness is in striving for it. "That His Kingdom may come and His will may be done on earth as in heaven. Communism strives for a social ideal. It has its five year program. It knows that it will not achieve its goal even in the third or fourth generation, but what has it, or facism, Nazism, or Humanism to offer in the meantime? In the meantime men may starve, calamities and disappointments may come. What provision have these "isms" for suffering souls before their scheme is realized?

Christianity is a pilgrim religion, a religion for imperfect men and situations, and meets the needs of all. Christianity is a religion of goals all along the Pilgrim's way, but it is not confined to goals. It is a religion for the journey, for men who fall short. That is what makes it great. It is a religion of Hope. Communism, Facism, Nazism have no hope for the individual here or hereafter. Christianity's hope is founded on God. That is its strength. And this hope in God transforms the individual here, so that the overworked East London preacher could carry on bravely, cheered by thoughts of Christ, the living bread. This renewal day by day is an inner renewal, a moral renewal, making a new man; an unending renewal that forsakes the temporal and accepts the eternal and heavenly, as a daily inspiration.

The preacher asked, "Have you not had enough disappointments in your earthly hopes and worldly schemes and systems, to make you willing to seek the daily renewals that come from God?"

The preacher's morning theme was "Faith Refined in the Fires of Experience." His text was Acts 1:22, "Confirming the souls of the disciples exhorting them to continue in the Faith, and that through many tribulations we must enter the Kingdom of God." Paul's first Missionary journey through Lycania, etc., while not the path of progress of Christianity, was the means of rich experience and taught two valuable lessons, that a door of faith was open-

ed to the Gentiles, and that we must enter the kingdom of God through many tribulations. Christianity works. This was demonstrated in Lycania, had been demonstrated in uncivilized and degraded heathensism. In spite all the black facts of life around us, God calls us not to retreat, not even to stand still and hold on, but to go forward. The Kingdom of God can be had, but Christians must not be afraid, must be willing to pass through tribulations. "If any man will come after Me, let him deny himself."

"He that endureth to the end, shall be saved." The Kingdom of Heaven can only be had through those who will stand for it, suffer for it die for it, even the death of martyrs. It is the hid treasure; it is the pearl of great price. It is worth more than all the kingdoms and systems on earth. We can afford to lose the whole world to gain it.

The anniversary music was of especially high order. Mrs. Priest presided at the organ and the piano. Mrs. Ernest Hall, soloist from Hamilton, sang "Yea, the sparrow hath Found Her a Nest," and "Thanks be to God." The Quartette, composed of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Knapp, Miss Oppenhausner and Mr. Code, sang "I Hear Thy Welcome Voice," and "Nearer, Still Nearer" Mrs. Knapp sang "Spirit of God," and the choir sang "I was Glad when They said unto Me, Let Us Go into the House of the Lord" and "I will Lift up mine Eyes." Mrs. Hall has a rich musical voice, and the Hanover singers blended harmoniously with distinct articulation.

The eighty-sixth anniversary celebrations were concluded with an evening with Robert Burns, presented in his own way by Rev. A. Forsyth, M. A., B. D. of Warkenton, and illustrated with colored lantern slides, on Tuesday evening September 19th.
