On Wednesday evening Sept. 13th there passed away suddenly at her home in the village of Holstein an esteemed resident of the community, Janet Warnock Munn, beloved wife of James F. McInnes in her seventy-fifth year. Mrs. McInnis had not been in the best of health for some time but her death came as a shock to her friends. Young Bentinck Lad Sent

Before Magistrate Spence police court here Friday last were no less than twelve in the docket, but two being and two others held over, the session was concluded in a few hours.

Norman Minto of Elmwood, ed guilty to not having brakes car in working condition, and fine of \$10 and costs, amounting to \$14.50.

An action against Jas. Morris, reckless driving, laid by Prov. Franco of Walkerton, was adjourned for two weeks.

Wilfred Woods, Owen Sound, was charged with the theft of a caulking gun and caulking compound from Cross & Eatherland's here. Left, pleaded not guilty to the action, but the bench otherwise, and remanded to Monday for sentence, when was given a term of two months in jail.

A similar charge against a girl of his, John Lethbridge of a girl, was dismissed.

An action against Harold Pinder of Dundalk, for driving with permit, was also adjourned to Court.

Stanley Morris and Elvin McEwen of Mount Forest were charged with Constable Flynn, with in Letter Brown vicinity with run license. They pleaded guilty to the charge, and remanded to Monday for sentence, when was given a term of two months in jail.
