DEPT. OF MILITIA AND DEFENCE GUARD GOVERNMENT PROPERTY

All precautions are being taken to protect government property throughout the Dominion and it is estimated that 10,000 members of the Non-Permanent Militia are on duty.

Destined, it is believed, to be one of the greatest Canadian war bases, Camp Borden is now a hive of war-like activity.

All entrances are guarded, armed military sentries being on duty at all points and barricades being placed across the roads.

To enter, a motor vehicle must produce a permit, after which the license number, names of the occupants, and time, are carefully recorded.

Members of the Irish Regiment of Toronto are on guard at the R.C.A. F. Station. This area is particularly well guarded.

GUARDS AT EUGENIA FALLS

The Provincial Authorities have taken measures to prevent sabotage in the plants of the Hydro Electric System of Ontario and guards have been placed at all power plants, and transmission stations.

Orders came from the Department of Militia and Defence at Ottawa for a guard to be placed over the armories at Markdale and a Sergeant and three men from the Flesher-ton platoon of the Grey and Simcoe Regiments were placed on duty that night.

Guards have been placed over the Welland canal and all other points where sabotage would cause a tie-up in communications.
