Spread generously between bread slices; spread outside of each sandwich with melted butter, toast on both sides under low broiler heat until brown. Pour over the sandwich a sauce made of melted cheese.

Flake one pound of corned or cooked fish and place in casserole. Slowly melt 1/2 lb. cheese in double boiler; stir in 1/2 cup milk. Pour this over the fish. Cover the mixture with mashed cooked potato, and line the rim of the casserole with unshredded biscuits. Bake in hot (425°) oven until biscuits are done.

### WAR TAX NOW PAYABLE ON ALL HYDRO BILLS

The local Hydro Electric Commission has been informed by the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission offices at Toronto, that all bills for use of electric light or power will henceforth be subject to a Dominion War Revenue sales tax of 5 p. c. This is in accordance with provisions of the war budget recently announced by the Dominion Government, and will be effective beginning with the bills for September—October.

Fallaise, instrumental by Marguerite Hutton, Mary Smith, and Myrtle Sparring, impersonation by Miss Oldfield, drill by Girl Guides, reading of gazette by Norman Lenahan.

Holstein Corr: The second day of Holstein Fair was a good as the first, a trifle chilly perhaps but this did not prevent a robbing attendance, less than 1913 may be, but the gate receipts eclipsed all records running up to \$302. The entries in cattle and horses were very numerous, there being 115 cattle beasts on the grounds and over 100 horses.
