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THE ROLL CALL

MRS. WILLIAM ADLAM

Mrs. William Adlam, a well-known and highly respected resident of Bentinck township, passed away Friday morning at her home near Mulceke. Mrs. Adlam had been in failing health for the past two years and on Wednesday suffered a severe heart attack, from which she failed to rally, passing away early Friday morning.

The late Mrs. Adlam, whose maiden name was Helena Hazett, was born at Allan Park, and was the youngest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Hazett. She was in her sixty-third year, and was married on Dec. 5th, 1906, to Mr. Wm. Adlam, a prominent farmer of Bentinck township. Mrs. Adlam was a woman of pleasing disposition, attractive personality, superior ability, and her passing will be keenly felt by her husband and family, and by a legion of friends. She was a devout member of Allan Park Anglican church.

Left to mourn her passing are her husband and four sons, Elton and Clifford, at home, Reginald, teacher at Nipissing, and Arthur, manager of the Durham Farmers' Co-operative Company, also one sister, Mrs. A. Wilson of Durham. She was deceased by a son, Willie, who passed away at the age of 18 years, an infant son, two sisters, Mrs. Ben Sharpe and Mrs. Alfred Redford, and one brother, William T. Hazlett.

The funeral was held Monday afternoon from her late residence, services at the house and grave being conducted by her rector, Rev. W. C. Allison of Hanover, assisted by Rev. C. Saunders of Mulock, who referred in glowing terms to the well-known worth of the departed and the fullness of the life that had closed. Interment was in the family plot in Durham cemetery.

All Lights Darkened throughout Edinburgh

A letter from Miss Agnes Binnie of Edinburgh, Scotland, to her McGill cousins in Durham, dated Oct. 1, 1939, gives a vivid picture of war conditions in the Old Land. She says "We have all been so upset with this terrible war. Our windows are all darkened at night and we are not allowed to have the least streak of light down the sides, and it is so difficult. We have black paper pasted all around the windows, black blinds and dark curtains to draw at the back. There is no street lighting. Trams and busses have blue lights. You can hardly see them. It is most dangerous to go out at night. We had nothing like that the last war. We go to business and church carrying our gas masks. All the beautiful parks and open spaces are dug up and air raid shelters made. We live in a flat and the shelters are a little way off, so we shall just have to take our chance and remain in the house. It is so early dark now, and we won't go out after dark.

The education authorities advised all children be evacuated, but only a proportion went and some of them have returned home again, which the authorities say is foolish. Mothers could accompany children under school age.

Willie's children have been evacuated to Selkirk, next to Galashiels on the borders. They have been most fortunate—a modern house, plenty of accommodation, and a huge garden, much to the children's delight. The gentleman of the house lived alone and had someone come in to work for him, so he thought he was doing his duty, offering his house to a wife and family. Willie's wife does the work meantime, and all are very happy. He is fond of the children and they go to church with him.

Food is not scarce. We get everything we ask for, and are not rationed yet, but some people buy more than their needs.

The churches are going in, in the afternoons, instead of evening. We are all busy knitting these days for the troops."

Bogle of Varney, as announced some weeks ago. There were 47 organizations in the province who entered this competition, and each local first prize winner, was visited by Mr. Knapp, to decide the provincial winners. Among the 47 winners Mr. Bogle was placed 11th, a very creditable showing. There was but slight difference in the scores of all the winners.

The first Provincial prize winner was Iorrie Richardson, R. R. No. 4, Woodstock, who wins \$250; 2nd was Robert Sinclair of Churchill; 3rd, E. A. Monteith of R. R. 3, Embro. Even for 11th place, Mr. Bogle will receive a cash prize, and also an award from the Wawanesa Insurance Co.

One exhibitor, who has shown at many fairs in this part of the province, stated Durham had the best all-round fair he had attended this year, with the exception of Teeswater.

For 1939, Teeswater sets a new high mark in gate receipts of \$2,647.75. With grandstand, concert and dance receipts added, their income was \$2,187.60. Last year Teeswater gate was \$2,292, and the previous high year was 1936, with a \$2,214 gate. With funds like these available, it is not so much of a problem to put on a outstanding fair.
