Q. How can I test the purity of the air in a room? A. Pour some lime water into a glass. If a thin, white scum forms on top, there is an excess of carbonic acid in the air and a need of more ventilation.

Q. How can I make a good substitute for baking powder? A. Mix 1/2-teaspoon of soda with This solution is equal to 2 tea-

14-teaspoon of cream of tartar. spoons of baking powder. Q. How can I whiten and purify a sponge? A. Soak the sponge in milk and

thoroughly rinse in warm water with a little carbolic acid. Q. How can I cause coal to burn better, and also produce less soot in the chimney and flues?

A. A suggested treatment is that as soon as the coal has been placed in the bin, pour a strong solution of salt and water over it. Wait until the coal has drained before using, as wet coal has a tendency to burn out the grate bars and fire-pot.

Q. How can I prevent soap from entering my eyes when giving myself a shampoo? A. Before the shampoo, grease the area around the eyes with

Peace Through Education Dr. Wallace said that the pur-

pose of education was "the development of those qualities with which nature has endowed each individual, and also to add to that body of men and women whose business it is to help in the great task of moral, social and spiritual regeneration of the world in which

He thought that up to now, educationists might have failed just through making education more interesting, in that it had become less exacting than a generation

"It takes really hard work to discipline the mind, and yet somehow we seem to have forgotten that it must be done," he declared.
