The late Bandmaster, Thos. Box, having returned to the Old Land for military duties, left the band without a leader, and the finances of the Musical Society did not warrant bringing in a new man. Accordingly the members met on Monday night and elected Mr Frank Bunce, solo cornetist, to take charge for a three month's term.

The Directors of the Cement Works here, moved by the brave Belgians, have decided to cut out their annual banquet this year and will make a contribution of \$75 to the fund for Belgian relief.

A well known resident of Boothville passed away on Saturday last week when the death call came to David Runciman. He was suffering for sometime with a gangrene trouble, which brought the end when he had passed the three score and ten limit of the palmist.

It is reported that Mr Cecil Gun has gone from New York to the front, but whether to join the navy or army we have not heard.

Dread of Zeppelin raids on London and Paris are increasing. More stringent orders to darken streets at night have been made. Theatres are giving up evening performances so that lights may be cut out and licensed houses, restaurants and aristocratic clubs must stop all sale of intoxicants at one o'clock.
